> Washington. - Figures showing that 2,879,000 individuals would pay new or additional taxes should corporations-faced with a proposed tax on their undivided income-distribute all earnings among stockholders were submitted by treasury authoritics to a house ways and means sub-

Speaker Byrns said he thought the forthcoming tax bill would include levies on undistributed corporate earnings, processing taxes, a "windfall" tax to recapture returned or unpaid processing taxes-and noth-

If a general revision of the tax structure is to be undertaken, it can be done next January, the speaker told reporters.

That would postpone any action on sales or broader income taxes until after the elections.

In the face of sentiment moving in the opposite direction, the speaker exemptions in the proposed levy on corporate earnings not divided among stockholders, because corporations still could pay the tax and build up sufficient reserves for hard times.
