Mrs. W. H. Frizzel, past 82 years of age, passed away at their home in Weeping Water last Friday after having been confined to her bed for the past nearly four years with a broken hip which she sustained in a fall.

Miss Mary Rowe was born at Sidney, Iowa, some 82 years ago last March and has lived in this portion of the county during the greater part of her life. She was united in marriage to W. H. Frizzel on July 23, 1871, at Florence, Kansas. They were blessed with eight children, all of whom have passed away with the exception of one son, John, of Weeping Water and another Clarence of California. Some four years ago Mrs. Frizzel was injured when she slipped and fell, fracturing her hip which

never knit and she has been a patient until death came to her relief.

Funeral services were held from the Hobson funeral home and were conducted by the Rev. Percival, pastor of the Menonite church and interment made at Oakwood cemetery.

During her girlhood Mrs. Frizzel united with the Christian church and was a devoted member during the greater portion of her life. However she later became a communicant of the Menonite church in which faith she passed away. Early in the Civil war Mr. Frizzel volunteered as a soldier of the Union army and served with distinction through the entire war. He will be 94 years of age on August 19th and is the only member of the G. A. R. now living in Cass county. Mr. Frizzel is to make his home at the present with his son, John and family in Weeping Water.
