This is a reduction in the property tax load of \_\_\_\_\_\$ 128,448 These figures may be verified at the county treasurer's office. In each instance they are for two years, representing the biennial period. The 1929, 1930 and 1935 figures are from the footings of the tax list.

The 1956 figures are based on the taxed value of the county, to which has been applied the state tax rate of 1.76 mills, including the intangible tax. The population of this county is 17.684, and that reduction amounts to 87.26 for every man, woman and child in the county. The total property tax load for the state of Nebraska for 1929-20 was \$15,240,477, For 1935-36 it is \$5,198,434 a reduction of \$7,141,393.
