**Hearing Being  
Held in Stull  
Estate Matter**

**Special Administrator Seeks to Have  
Proceeds of Sale Turned into  
Estate Funds.**

From Wednesday's Daily—  
Judge A. C. Thomsen was engaged today in hearing an action in accounting against Frank E. Vallery, who had been designated in a bill of sale to handle the disposal of personal property in the estate of the late C. Lawrence Stull.

The deceased had deeded the real estate to several of the children, also making the arrangements for the disposal of the personal property and live stock by Mr. Vallery.

The validity of the deed and sale was attacked by Ira Stull, a son of the deceased and who had been omitted in the division of the property and who asked for the appointment of Searl S. Davis as administrator, while the petition of the other heirs had asked for the naming of Mr. Vallery.

The parties were unable to agree on the administrator and accordingly W. H. Schmidtman was named as the administrator and Carl D. Ganz as the attorney for Mr. Schmidtman. From this action an appeal is pending in the district court.

Searl S. Davis was designated to act as special administrator until the matter of the administrator was definitely settled.

The case heard today is one in which it is sought to have Mr. Vallery turn over to the special administrator proceeds of the sale held of the personal property and what property may remain in his hands.

Witnesses called today were Dr. G. H. Gilmore, the physician of Mr. Stull in his last illness, as well as Attorney C. E. Martin who drew the bill of sale and T. H. Pollock, a witness to the signing of the bill of sale that designated Mr. Vallery to handle the sale.

**Fine Response  
to Cemetery  
Board Plans**

**Hope to Have Contact With All Lot  
Owners on the Proposition of  
Care of Cemetery.**

The cemetery board recently sent letters to all of the owners of lots in Oak Hill cemetery, asking their reaction to the plan of a yearly assessment of \$3 for each lot to provide for its care and maintenance.

There have been a large number of replies received and the proposition seems to be finding much favor from the owners and gives hope that the plans of the board may successfully be carried out for a cemetery that will be in excellent shape at all seasons of the year.

It is the desire to have all persons who have lots to indicate their desires in the matter, it depending largely on the replies, the carrying out of the future plans. The fee has been set at the \$3 mark for the year to determine just how much can be depended on for this part of the revenues of the cemetery.

It may be possible to set the assessment in other years at a lower figure but this sum was fixed upon as reasonable and one that should produce a very good revenue if the response is general and assure the cemetery being kept up in excellent shape and improvements wished made in the two cemeteries.
