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Cass County Farm Bureau Notes

Annual Feeders' Day.

With feed scarce and high in price and several months time before feed crops can be harvested, unusual interest is centering in Nebraska around the twenty-fifth annual Feeders' Day scheduled to be held at the Nebraska College of Agriculture, on Friday, April 16. Several Cass county livestock producers are expected to attend.

Farmers at the college for the day will hear about experimental tests in which various substitute feeds are compared with standard feed available under normal conditions on farms. Much work has been done comparing molasses to corn for fattening animals and all results will be disclosed that day.

Two of the headline speakers on the program include Prof. H. P. Rusk, chairman of the animal husbandry department at the University of Illinois, and Jesse Harper, former Notre Dame football coach but now a Kansas livestock producer. The former, a well known national livestock authority, speaks about, "Some Illinois Beef Making Practices of Interest to Nebraska Cattlemen." Harper, who will be introduced by Coach "Biff" Jones of Nebraska, will tell why the cattle business suits him better than football.

On With 4-H Clubs.

Applications for two more 4-H clubs have been received the past week. The "Mary Ann's Cooking Club," of Murdock, of which Mrs. A. H. Ward is leader, has a membership of 11 girls enrolled for Learning to Cook. Miss Merle Eveland of Elmwood organized a group of fourteen for the same project, which brings the total enrollment for the county up to about 175. The Learning to Cook project is the major project for the ten to twelve year old girls this year, and seems to be well liked.

Mr. Loys Smith, who divides his time assisting the agricultural agents of Cass and Otoe counties, will devote some time to 4-H club work. During the past week he has met with several groups to help organize 4-H clubs, and has been contacting many of last year's club members and leaders in an effort to get acquainted and promote the reorganization of old clubs. If you are interested in extension work in Cass county, we invite you to make Mr. Smith's acquaintance.

To Hold Group Achievements.

Outstanding features of the group achievement programs to be held by Cass county's women's project clubs, are the rural women's choruses and the club history to be given for each club in the group. If you don't think country women can sing, it's because you've missed hearing one of these rural choruses. And if you don't think women's project club work has grown till it's become a household necessity, it's because you've never looked into the history of a single one of these clubs. There'll be lots of good music, plenty of historical facts relating to project clubs, their origin, who their charter members were, etc., playlets and a panel discussion included in each of the group achievement programs. The Louisville Achievement will be held at the Town Hall, April 15th, and the Elmwood Achievement at the Community building on April 16th. Anyone interested in women's project club work is welcome to attend these programs.

Women to Have Program at Feeders' Day.

Women who accompany their husbands to Feeders' Day at the college of agriculture, Friday, April 16th, have a special program planned for them. Prof. Wm. J. The Hartley Mothers Rural Chorus will appear on the afternoon program and Miss Grace Morton and the clothing classes will present a Spring Fashion Review. Pasture Contest Deadline.

Cass county farmers have until Thursday April 15, to enter the statewide pasture contest, they were reminded this week. A total of four farmers have entered to date. They are: H. E. Iske, Plattsmouth; Lester Wagener, Cedar Creek; Eldon Mendelhall, Elmwood; and W. G. Hoffman, Alvo.

Record blanks will be supplied soon to all entrants in the contest for keeping records on the amount of grazing secured and methods of pasture management. Each cooperator will be visited this fall to determine the success of the pasture program followed on the individual farm. The 1937 contest will probably close with the third annual banquet in Omaha where county and state winners will be announced.
