DEFICIENCY OF RAINFALL

They drove down in their car duced a total deficiency of 123,651,- and spent a most enjoyable week in 093 acre feet of moisture in Ne- the secion of country where Sherman braska, study of rainfall and water and wife spent their childhood days. conservation by state and federal agencies disclosed today.

The study was part of a report submitted by Governor Cochran to federal officials at Washington recently where he sought financial aid for drouth destitute farmers.

The report stated that a rainfall deficiency of 31.50 inches during the past seven years brought a corresponding decrease in soil moisture surface water, and ground water sup-

plies. Present soil moisture was calculated as ranging between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 acre feet and against a maximum for the state of about

13,000,000. "Although the water table is lower than at any time previously studied, the general situation is far better than commonly supposed." the survey said. Survey officials said the water table has decreased no more than a foot at most places.
