He personally filed petitions con taining 1,376 names which were ac cepted by the secretary of state. Only 1.000 signatures are required. Elliott will compete against Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, democratic nominee and William Edward Johnson of Schuyler, republican candidate.

In a statement Ellrott sharply attacked Carpenter's candidacy without referring to him by name.
