For a number of years they have allowed a minimum of 20,000 pounds in a car of this class of freight and under this rule, five or thirty horses or mules might be shipped as long as there was 20,000 pounds. This has led private concerns to build hundreds of large cars and this had the effect of cutting out the cars of the railroads. It is now proposed that only twenty head be loaded in a car and in excess of this a charge be made for each additional 1,000 pounds.—World-Herald.

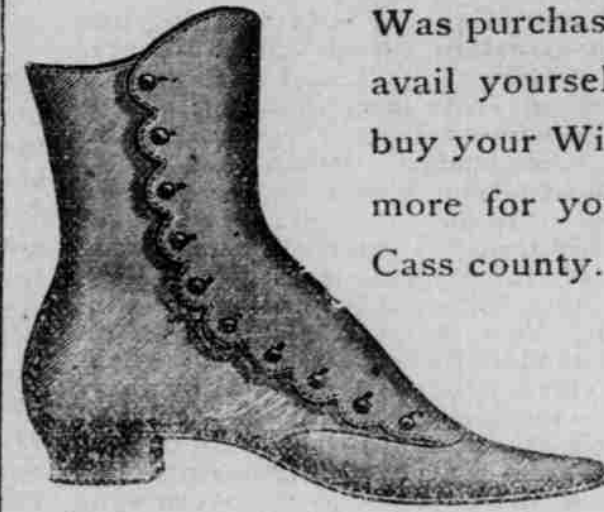
