"Judge Scott overruled Charles Cum mings' application for a new trial yesterday and sentenced Cummings to ten years at hard labor in the penitentiary, that being the limit for manslaughter, of which cummings was convicted. Cummings had been convicted of murder in the second degree in killing Judd Vance of Plattsmouth, Septemder 19, by striking him over the head with a billiard cue, Vance dying three days later from the effects of the plow. The trouble occurred over discussion of the payment for a game of pool. Cummings had pleaded selfdefence, claiming that he and another man, also from Plattsmouth, were quarreling about the price of the game when Vance stepped up with a one in his hand and appeared about to strike Cummings when the latter picked up a cue and struck Vance over the head. "Cummings will at once appeal the case to the supreme court."
