fety we give them lest in our overanxlety we give them a degree of independence for which they are unfit, thereby inviting reaction and disaster. As fast as there is any reasonabio
hope that in a given district the people can govern themselves self-government has been given in that district. There is not a locality fitted for self-government which has not received it.
But it may well be that in certain cases But it may well be that in certain cases
it will have to be withdrawn because the inhabitants show themselves unfit to exercise it. Such instances have already occurred. In other word.3, there is not the slightest chance of our falling to show a sufficiently humanitarian spirit. The danger comes in the opposite direction.

There are still troubles ahead in tha islands. The insurrection has become an affair of local banditti and marauders, who deserve no higher regard thar the brigands of portions of the old world. Encouragement, direct or indirect, to these insurrectos stands on the same footing as encouragement to hostile Indians in the days when we still had Indian wars. Exactly as our aim is to give to the Indian who remains peaceful the fullest and amplest consideration, but to have it underif he goes on the warpath, so we must make it evident, unless we are false to our own traditions and to the demands of civilization and humanity that while we whi do everything in our power for the Fhipino who is peaceful we will take the sternest measures with the Filipino who fol-
lows the path of the insurrecto and the ladrone.
