The funeral, therefore, was held in the Fifty-sixth regiment armory, which accommodated 6,000. Devoted friends of the late senator crowded every available space in the building. Standing outside were almost 3,000 people straining to catch a word of the eulogies being pronounced on the dead statesman by his associates in civil and political
