"Capt. S. H. Moer, was born in the State of Ohio, in the year 1829, from a seat in the Iowa Legislature from a district composed of several counties. As a chosen representative of the new party, which had just been organized, he defended and advocated its principles with a zeal, and ability which contributed in a great degree to insure the success in this State, which it after wards attained. As a Legislator, he was deeply imbu d with the sentiments and feelings of his constituents, and esponsed their interest with that undring energy, and practicability in the application of means, which through his entire life shone most brilliant. 2. Examine the vignette or picture in the middle of the top; see if the sky or background looks clear and transparent, or soft and even, and not scratchy. 3. Examine well the face; see if the expressions are distinct and easy, natural and lifelike, particularly the

4. See if the drapery or dress fits well, looks natural and easy, and shows the fold distinctly.

5. Examine the medallion, ruling and heads, and circular ornaments Piano Fortes. Melodeons, Music and around the figures, etc. See it they are regular, smooth and unitoria, not scratchy This work, in the genuine, looks as it raised on the paper, and can not be perfectly imitated.

6. Examine the principle line of etters or name of the bank. See it they are upright, perfectly true, or, it doping, of a uniform slope.
