This speaks well for that locality, and shows a spirit of enterprise that cannot fail to have its effect. We learn that Dr. Thomas is also erecting a fine residence at that place.

Our old friend Jenks has bought a half interest in the store of Horton & Co., at Weeping Water. He was in the city this week laying in a stock of goods, and among other things we noticed he was getting a good supply of Republican documents in the shape of school books. Jenks is a good business man, and will assist materially in bringing the Weeping Water Country into notice.

A gentleman who was traveling through the country last week assures us that, notwithstanding the great crop of grasshoppers, he never saw a better prospect for heavy crops than at present. The grasshoppers have done, and are still doing some injury; but the greater portion of wheat is looking remarkably good. He thinks there will be double the wheat raised in this county the present season that there was last year.

The News suggests that a premium be offered in each county, by the County Commissioners, for the four largest and best cultivated tracts of timber land. We are in favor of that, or any other method that will beget a spirit of timber culture in the State. The timber will grow fast enough if people will only plant it and keep the fire out. There are trees in this county now that measure two feet in diameter which were planted since we came to Nebraska.

We made a short journey into the country last Tuesday, and were surprised to see the improvements being made. Nearly all the old roads through the country are fenced up, and new fences reach as far as the eye can see. Thousands of acres of fresh sod are being turned over; new houses are going up all over the country, and everything indicates prosperity and permanence. The grasshoppers have done considerable injury in places, but the chances are yet good for heavy crops. A few years more of prosperity and Cass will resemble the old settled counties of the east.

Mr. Wake, who founded an English Colony on the Blue river, in this State, writes to his friends in the old country that those who came out to the colony are doing well and are satisfied with the country. It is a fine country that contains no dissatisfied people.

Two prisoners, named McGregor and Patterson, broke jail in this city about 1 o'clock last Sunday, while sheriff Johnson and family were away from home. They were awaiting the setting of the Court on charges of larceny. McGregor being the chap, of whom we made mention recently, that was so badly scared by the Plattsmouth "Vigilantes". There were three prisoners—the other one named Ford, also held on an indictment for larceny found by the Olney County Grand Jury, refused to go with them, but gave the alarm as soon as they were out. They tore the ceiling loose from above, burst open the floor into the room where sheriff Johnson and family lived, stole what edibles they could find, and made for the river a short distance below town. They stripped off and swam the river and have not been heard from since. Sheriff Johnson is still in pursuit at the present writing. The remaining prisoner says they intended breaking out some days before, but were prevented by threats from him of giving the alarm. He says he was asleep, and did not hear them until just as the last one was going out through the hole, and that he then gave the alarm.

The following is the description of them, as given us by sheriff Johnson. Gen. Patterson is a smooth faced boy, about 16 or 17 years old, fair complexion, pale blue eyes, dark hair cut very short, is about 5 feet 5 or 6 inches high, weighs about 125 pounds; has a habit of putting his hand to his chin when talking; he has a scar on one of his feet, running from the toes back towards the instep. He had on, when he left, an old pair of boots, run over at the heels, blue Jeans pants, an old gray coat, the inside seam of one of the legs of his pants is sewed with white thread about the knee. McGregor is about 22 years old, about 5 feet 9 or 10 inches high, has grey eyes, and they are generally red and sore. His hair is cut short, and is neither dark nor light. He has a large scar on the top of his head, and a scar on his wrist. He wears a narrow leather strap around his waist; and had on, when he left, an old pair of stogy boots, soldier's blue pants, soldier's dark blue dress coat. Their arrest will be suitably rewarded.
