Watering Plants in Summer.

It is not wise to begin to water plants in the garden, unless it is intended to follow it up thoroughly. If plants in the open ground are watered, they throw out their little roots near the surface to drink in the moisture, and if afterwards the watering be neglected, these little fibrous roots perish for lack of moisture and the plant suffers. When they are not wa-tered at all, the little roots go down deep er in search of moisture, and in well cul tivated soil, in good condition, they usually find enough to keep them from suf fering. unless the drought continues unusually long. If it seem necessary to give water it should be given copiously in quantity, sufficient to go down to the bottom of the roots; a sprinkling that merely wets the surface is worse than none. Syringing the leaves to wash off the dust, done in the evening after the sun is down, will improve the appearance and health of plants.

Americans in British Honduras.

A recent English Blue Book states that in 1867 a grant of 300,000 acres of land in British Honduras was made to a Mr. Putnam and four other citizens of the United States, who had become naturalized in that country. The "leacos Grant." as it is called, extends from the sea coast on the east to the frontier of Guatemala on the west, and lies between Monkey and Deep rivers, The purchase money was £20,000 (\$100,000), payable in ten equal annual instalments, commencing in 1873. The grants are required to settle fifty families within five years. Thre-fourths of the purchase money is to be expended by the Government in public improvements within the settlement.
