OUR SCHOOLS.

The High School business for the next year is finally arranged, apparently satisfactorily. At one time the Board decided to take the scholars from the High School building and return them to the wards. This came so near abolishing the graded system that the Mayor thought it not safe to try.

As it now stands there will be six months school in the High School building with Miss Johnson in charge of the grammar class, and the other grades to be left as they were essentially with most of the old teachers. Here is the law bearing on these points: It establishes the School Board as a corporate body and vests all the authority in them.

In all cities wherein graded and High Schools have been or may hereafter be established.

We established a graded and High school here under this law, that is, under the law of 1874, which is not in force.

By this law our school system can only be revoked under certain conditions, as follows:

"That any City of the second class may suspend the operation of this law, by a majority vote of said city in favor of suspension, and the City authorities are empowered to submit such question of suspension at any municipal election of said town, when a petition signed by a majority of the citizens of said town shall be presented asking the same."

We Do It Again, And Not Busted.
