THE EASTERN STATUS. AFFAIRS IN CUBA!

LAST DAY OF THE CENTENNIAL! One of the James Brothers Captured!

LONDON, Oct. 13.—A dispatch from Ragusa, yesterday, says: "After the capture by the Turks of the hill of Visokina, on the 9th inst., Dervish Pasha advanced in the direction of Danilgrad. On the 10th and 11th he defeated various small detachments of Montenegrins. In one of these engagements the Montenegrins lost eighty men. On the 11th inst. several bands of Montenegrins attacked and almost surrounded Dervish Pasha, and simultaneously attacked Podgoritz with five battalions. Dervish Pasha was compelled to retreat with heavy loss, and to detach a considerable force for the relief of Podgoritz. Fighting continues between Moulkar Pasha and the Montenegrins, and the former is unable to make any forward movement."

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—The creditors of Turkey have seized 292 Krupp guns, which were being shipped from Antwerp for Turkey. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 13.—It is stated that, in addition to the note specifying the conditions on which the Porte grants an armistice, the Porte yesterday delivered to the ambassadors a note justifying the refusal to entertain the peace conditions submitted by the great powers, especially the autonomy proposed for Bosnia and Herzegovina.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—A dispatch from Belgrade dated to-day says: "The Serbian Cabinet Council decided not to accept the six months armistice determined upon by the Turkish Extraordinary Council last Tuesday because Serbia could not maintain her present large army during the winter, as she will also be obliged to support a large number of refugee families."

BARCELONA, Oct. 13.—Gen. Campos has taken leave of his garrison. Jovellar retains the Captain Generalship of Cuba, under the orders of Gen. Campos as Commander in Chief. It is believed that Campos will induce the insurgents to accept terms, and that the more resolute leaders will leave the island for a peculiar arrangement.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13.—The centennial committee are at work preparing the programme for the exercises of the day of closing, which they desire to render as imposing as the day of opening. The committee having the matter in charge, consisting of Gen. W. Gurney of S. C., J. Morrill of Pa., and W. A. Parriss of Texas, make their preliminary reports this afternoon, and by the beginning of the week it will be finished.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 13.—Frank James, one of the Clay Co. desperadoes, was arrested at 4 o'clock this evening, near the Big Blue, at the residence of Dr. Nolan, about ten miles west of our city, by Pinkerton's detectives, five in number. They surrounded the house and made the capture without any excitement save such as the residence portion of the family manifested.

Frank was at the doctor's, under treatment for a gunshot wound in one of his knees, received in Minnesota. The prisoner was taken to the railroad station and arrived in our city about 5 o'clock, and from here was taken to Wyandotte, and is now probably on his way to Chicago.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—The imprisonment of Tweed's partner, Edward A. Woodward, promises to be long, if he should the forgery indictment fall he will be promptly arrested in the civil suit to recover \$500,000, with bail at \$120,000, an impossible amount to furnish.

BOSTON, Oct. 13.—The steamboat express train from Fall River for Boston came in collision this morning with a local freight train at Randolph. Two engines of the steamboat train and the engine of the freight train, with the baggage and crate cars were completely wrecked. One fireman was killed, and engineers Deorow and Crosby, and passengers John Nagle and James M. Watson, of Boston, were injured.

NEW YORK, October 14.—A Herald special from Washington, says the written application of Gov. Chamberlain for troops to aid him in enforcing the law's civil magistracy, in the case of Son B. Carolina arrived yesterday and was placed before the aid by a delegation headed by Sen. or Patterson. The answer of the Secretary of War, after consultation, was that he should await the return of the President.

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Oct. 14.—The official count of the state election, completed to-day, shows the total vote, 189,604. Miller, democrat, receives a majority of 22,992 over Bishop, republican.

CHRYENNE, Oct. 14.—Sergeant Parker, with a detachment of the Second cavalry, came in contact with a large body of Indians, in a large body of miles west of Hanton ranch, at the head of Kawlake creek, and in a fight which ensued, private Tasker was killed and left on the field. The Indians have about 100 head of stock and are bidding for Bridger's ferry.
