On Thursday night as the 11:30 freight westward bound, in charge of conductor Young, was pulling out of the yard at this place, when out by the line kiln the way car and the one in front of it jumped the track and rolled down the bank and stopped on the bank of the river. The passengers in the way car were rolled and tumbled about lively. Three or four were bruised up considerably, and W. E. Carr, of Valparaiso Ind., was quite seriously injured, receiving a hard blow on the head and having his breast bone and three ribs broken; he was taken to the Saunders House and placed under Dr. Livingston's care. The other car that left the track contained 17 horses, 4 of which were killed outright, and the rest made their escape, but were brought in next day. The cause of the accident is unknown, but it occurred on a very rough piece of track which has since been repaired.
