We feel assured that with a little encouragement some local capitalists of industry or possibly some outsider could be induced to establish a factory of that kind here and it would prove of great benefit to the town.

While we are on the subject we may as well make a plea for a sorghum mill. We have noticed that pure country sorghum has been a scarce article for the last four years and when you find a gallon it is worth 75 cents. The jobbers buy all they can find and look for more. A good sized sorghum mill can be equipped with a very little expenditure of money and would yield handsome returns to the promoters. We will give a year's subscription to the Chief to the first man who establishes a canning factory or a sorghum mill in this city. Let others follow.

The editor of the Red Cloud Chief invites the readers of that paper to offer suggestion and criticisms. He says he desires to give them what they want and asks them to unhesitate themselves freely. Easter Services.

Easter services were held in three of our churches this year. This is always a joyous season. Every thing in nature speaks of resurrection and peoples thoughts naturally turn to the buds and newly awakened vegetation.

Special services were held in the Methodist church. The choir rendered two beautiful anthems entitled "Praise ye the Lord," and "The Knightly Pilgrim." The rendition of these anthems revealed the fact that the choir had spent considerable time in rehearsal. They charmed the audience with their music and their efforts were classed as among the best ever given in the city.

Rev. Stiffler took for his text John 11:18-19. This is one of the best sermons which we have had the pleasure of hearing Rev. Stiffler deliver. He argued his case as a lawyer would in court. He called witness after witness to testify and proved conclusively that there was but one solution to the mystery of Christ's disappearance and that was the fact that he had risen. And the speaker emphasized "Because I live ye shall live also."

Many of the membership of Grace Episcopal church were unable to attend the Easter services in that church owing to sickness but a good audience greeted Rev. Bates and assisted him by their presence in commemorating the resurrection of Jesus the Savior. The chief service of the Episcopal church on Easter day is always the Holy Eucharist and this was the only service used at the Grace church Sunday morning. The choir had prepared special music for the occasion of a high order and assisted in making the occasion memorable. Rev. Bates, the pastor, used for his text Acts 2:24-28. The speaker emphasized the inherent impossibility of death conquering Christ after he had conquered sin and had shown himself the Lord of life in his miracles and teaching. Rev. Bates is always scholarly in his addresses but on this occasion he delved clear down into the depths of research and gave his hearers a masterly discourse on the ever absorbing theme of life present and future.

Easter services were appropriately observed in the Congregational church Sunday morning. The Congregationalists always make much of Easter but Sunday was a red letter day owing to the attendance of Cyrene Commandery No. 14 K. T. They marched in a body from their hall in full dress uniforms. Special seats were reserved for them and the sergeants were as much for the Masons as for the church. In fact judging by the ritualistic work at the church an outsider would have considerable difficulty in deciding whether the church or the Masons were the most spiritual. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers whose fragrance penetrated every nook and corner of the building. The services were very impressive and enjoyable. The spirit of worship took hold of the audience, choir and pastor. Special mention should be made of the excellent showing made by the choir. The singing was as good as can be found in many of the city churches and the double quartet did themselves full justice and pleased the audience exceedingly. An offering was taken for the church building society and for retired ministers. Rev. Cressman took his text from Luke's gospel dwelling largely on the reasonableness of the belief of the immortality of the human soul. One statement struck us very forcibly. The speaker said that if the soul were not immortal and he were the only person in the world that knew it he would want his tongue cut out to the roots that he might not cast gloom, despondency and despair upon the whole human race. New Game Laws.

The game laws passed by the recent legislature provides for open seasons as follows: Chickens and grouse, October and November; ducks and geese, September 15 to April 15; jack snipe and yellow legs, September 15 to May 1; plover, July 15 to August 31; squirrels, October and November; black bass not less than six inches long, June 1 to November 15; trout, not less than eight inches long, April 1 to October 1; all other fish, April 1 to November 15.

There is no open season for quail, doves, swan or white crane.

Seine with meshes 2 inches square may be used in waters designated by the game warden if a license is obtained and a bond in the form of a certified check for \$100 is given to secure the state against misuse of a seine. This license is issued by the chief game warden and costs \$2. A permit to seine gives the holder a right to take carp, suckers, buffalo, gar and catfish, from June 1 to October 31 during daylight hours. The sale of carp, buffalo, catfish, suckers, sturgeon and gar fish is permitted under the new law. The sale of game birds is still prohibited.

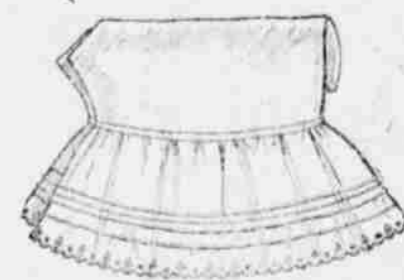

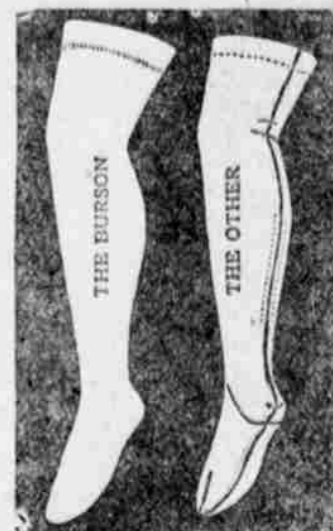
