Glacier National Park Newly Revealed Wonderland

An automobile road has been built from this station to the interior of the Park. To Determine Your Faculty For Managing

Any one who has to manage men or things must be able quickly to bring order out of confusion. Test your friend's talent in this respect by writing on your paper five words of a special class, such as the names of five flowers, or of five animals, or of five famous poets, with the first letter always in the right place, while the order of the other letters is changed. The person on whom you are experimenting knows only to which class the words belong—whether they are the names of animals, or of flowers or of poets. See how long it takes him to write the five correct words in place of the misspelled ones. The animal card may read, "Tetruil, etaleph, dykeno, serrip, galliro," and the vegetable card, "Veloti, diioffat, melap, morosinu, euttnesh." Some persons will be able to read at once: "Turtle, elephant, donkey, spider, gorilla," and the other card, "Violet, daffodil, maple, mushroom, chestnut." Others who have no talent for rearranging the elements of a confused situation will stare at the words, unable to make any sense of them—Professor Munsterberg, in *The Youth's Companion*.

Some Work For Burns

The big corporations that have to sweat and squirm every time there is a session of the legislature on at Lincoln are largely to blame for their perplexities.

They are victims of a system whereby they permit from year to year the most threatening legislation to be introduced and juggled by unprincipled legislators and hangers on of the legislature until they are ready to pay for having the legislation killed.

There has not been a session of the legislature in years in which the big interests in this state have not allowed themselves to be held up. The business in that line is not so brisk as it once was, but it is still brisk.

There is a way to stop it. They found it in Ohio and utilized it until they got a number of legislators into the penitentiary. They have been trying it of late in West Virginia, and have some of the statesmen on the anxious seat. They ought to try it in Nebraska. It would be a good thing to have some of William J. Burnham men put in a winter at the Nebraska capital. So flagrant are the holdups that are constantly worked to screw money out of railroads, insurance companies and other big interests that it would be an easy task to set a trap for the unscrupulous adventurers who milk the corporations.

The interests have followed the wrong system. They have stationed men at the capital to head off that class of legislation. This is just what the introducers of hostile legislation want. They know to whom to look for what they are after. The agents of the corporations rather fatten off this sort of sandbagging. If it did not exist there would be no employment for them. They would be without an occupation.

If the interests that are in the habit of allowing themselves to be milked every session would co-operate for one winter in the establishment at Lincoln of a competent corps of detectives, it would certainly result in exposures that would put a stop to the legislative hold-up. Until they do so, they are going to be compelled every year to buy off a lot of fellows who get in to the legislature solely for grafting or have friends in that body whom they can use toward the same end. The people will think the better of the corporations if they adopt some means of protecting themselves from the grafters who get into politics. It would put the big interests in a much better light before the people of the state than the employment of an army of paid lobbyists to buy off the promoters of hostile legislation.—Omaha Examiner.
