**Obituary**

Margaret Rosemond Bieker was born in Webster county, Nebraska, on the 13th day of September, 1860. She grew to womanhood in this part of the state of Nebraska, being absent with her parents for a few years in an adjacent county in the State of Kansas, and for a brief period in the State of Mississippi.

She attended the Red Cloud public schools and about 14 years ago was joined in marriage to I. W. Edson, since which time her home has been in Webster county. Five children came to bless her union with her husband, and to them the fruitful years and overflowing love of her loyal and devoted heart have been given beyond measure.

Although to some extent joining in the public work of her church, where in she found great delight, yet her greatest measure of efficiency was in the Bible school of her church, where as a Teacher she was singularly successful, a large class always greeting her, and from the number thus taught by her additions to the church were not uncommon.

Her ministry to the sick and bereaved was very notable, but it must be here written that her most marked characteristic was her devotion to her family; she loved flowers and fruits and works of art, but willingly sacrificed her desires for many things in the unselfish purpose of bestowing all her efforts for the benefit of those she loved.

She was younger than her husband by some years, but to him she was a most devoted counselor and companion, strong and helpful, her hopeful spirit never failing, her cheerfulness most remarkable.

"Her sun has gone down while it was yet day," her earthly labors have closed with scarcely a note of warning that the end was near, but the influence of a refined and beautiful life remains as a permanent blessing to all who loved her. Her union with the Baptist church of Red Cloud has existed for a number of years.

Her death occurred on Friday evening at about 11 o'clock and the funeral was observed at the residence on Monday at 2 o'clock p. m., Rev. Geo. W. Hummel conducting the service assisted by Rev. A. L. Candee and Rev. Meredith of Kansas.

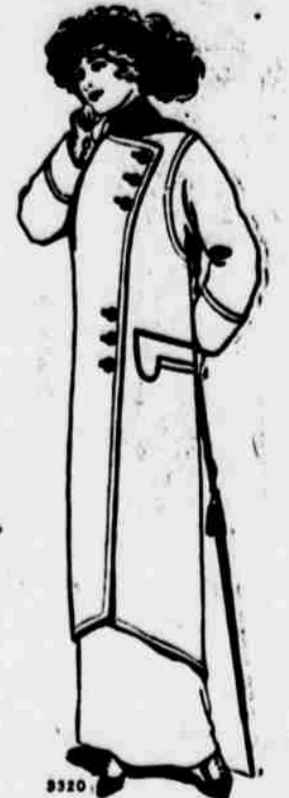
