Commissioners Proceedings

Red Cloud, Neb., April 18, 1914. The Board met pursuant to adjournment, with members all present, viz: McCall, Ohmstede, Hoffman, Storey and Chaplin, chairman of the Board. On motion the annual settlement with road overseers for district No. 11, was approved. E. T. Poe was appointed justice of the peace in and for Cowles product village. T. A. Hefflin was appointed road overseer for road district No. 11 1/2. The official bond of Wm McClure as overseer of district 12, and W. W. Wegman overseer of road district 12 1/2, was approved. On motion John Boyke was appointed road overseer of district 4 1/2, and bond approved. Official bond of John Zimmerman as overseer of road district No. 2 was approved. J. S. Kudrna was appointed overseer of road district No. 6 1/2. Annual settlement of overseer road district No. 7 was approved. On motion plans and specifications for court house were adopted, same to be the plans of W. F. Gernhardt, of Omaha, and now on file with the county clerk. C. E. Evans appeared before the board and offered to continue his contract, provided the board would agree to pay him \$25 for extra labor and expense incurred on account of his being unable to hire labor at same price, as he could have hired it at the time of original contract. Moved and seconded that the offer be accepted, building to be moved by May first. Carried. On motion L. Shank was appointed overseer of road district 16 1/2. Com. Chaplin asked for a 20 foot bridge one mile south of Lawrence on county line between sections 36 and 24. On motion Chaplin was instructed to erect a 16-foot cement culvert. Storey asked for one 10x32 arch culvert and 8x32 arch culvert, both 1 1/2 miles west of Red Cloud. On motion Storey was authorized and instructed to build said culverts. McCall asked for cement floor and wings for bridge at Sutton's, in Walnut Creek. One 24 feet 24 inch tube cement ford at Clouds. One cement bridge at Arnold's and to finish bridge in Harmony.
