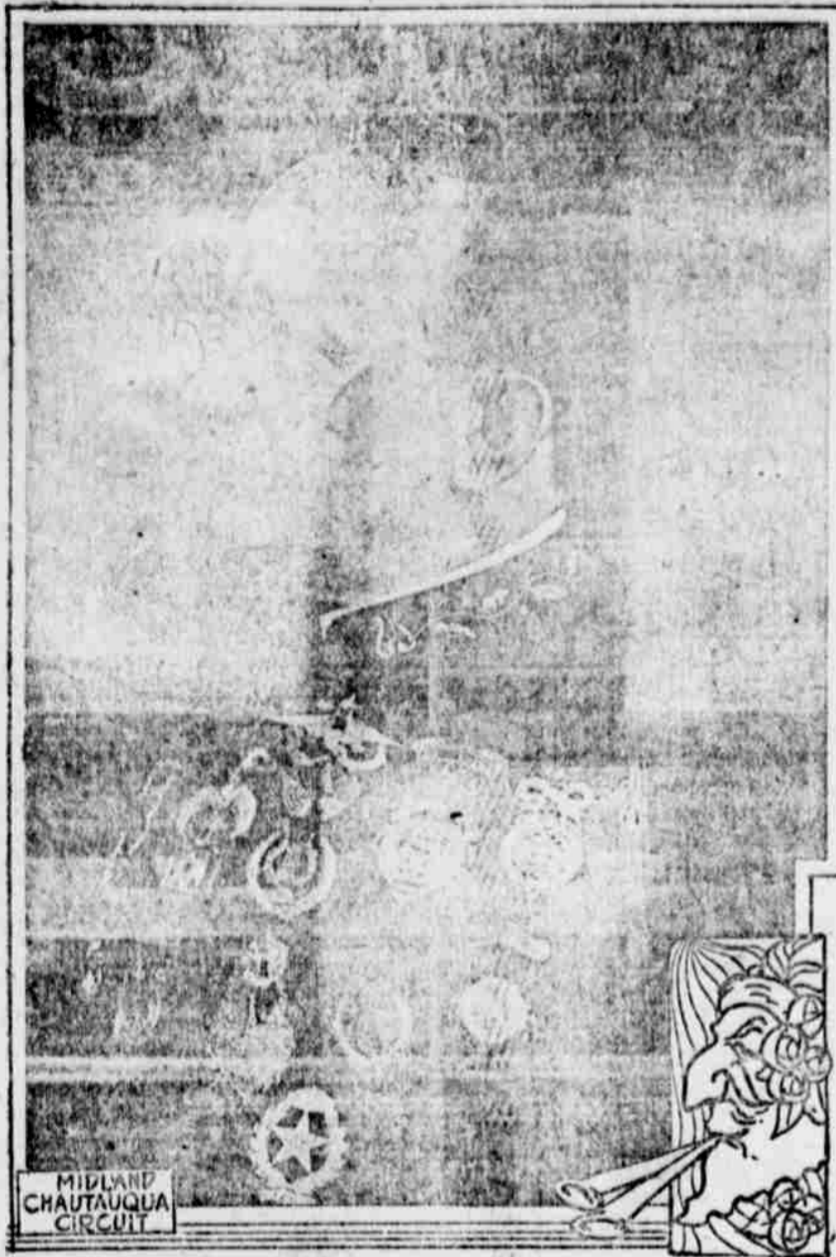


**SIGNOR ALEXANDER LIBERATI**  
World Famous Band Master



**S**IGNOR Alexander Liberati, who will visit this community during the Chautauqua with his band of twenty-eight musicians and opera singers is the most famous band leader and cornet soloist of America and is well known in many European countries. Mr. Liberati has had a long and eventful career. He rose rapidly from the ranks of a private soldier to a position of honor and trust. His first experience in service was that of a private soldier in the Province of Tyrol in the Ninth Regiment Italian Volunteers under Col. Menotti Garibaldi in 1866.

In 1867 he became the first Cornetist in the First Regiment Kings Brigade of the Italian army. In 1871 he was a volunteer in the Foreign Legion Fifth Battalion, in the Franco-Prussian War. In 1873 he became bandmaster and cornet soloist to his Excellency, Earl Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada. Following this last appointment the musical lovers and band builders of the world had their eyes on the famous Italian. Offers came thick and fast. After filling many positions of honor he became leader and director of Liberati's famous Seventy-first Regimental Band of the N. G. S., N. Y., Col. E. A. McAlphin commanding, which band successfully toured the United States.

In 1887 Colonel Blethen, now editor of the Seattle Daily Times, concluded arrangements with Signor Liberati to bring his famous band and opera singers from New York to Minneapolis for the exposition held in that city, where he played a successful engagement of seven successive weeks.

Signor Liberati in addition to a clear record of thirty-eight years as virtuoso, conductor and impresario upon this side of the Atlantic, always presents vocal soloists such as are heard elsewhere only in first class Grand Opera Companies. No other virtuoso or handmaster past or present can show a like record, based wholly upon merit and consequent results of artistic performances.

**M**ISS Fola La Follette, daughter of U. S. Senator Robert M. La Follette, who will appear on the local Chautauqua platform, is one of the most noted women that have ever visited our town and community. After graduating from the University of Wisconsin she chose the stage as the field of her professional career and her reputation is well established throughout all America. Also she is the first well known American actress to give the great plays in which she has appeared in monologue form. Also she has taken great interest in and added much to the cause of universal suffrage. Her appearance here will be in a lecture entitled, "The Democracy of Woman Suffrage." Regarding her ability as a public speaker and especially in the cause of suffrage we desire to quote three well known Americans who have heard her, as follows:

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**GLACIER NATIONAL PARK**  
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This region of majestic, glacier-capped mountains—the climax of the rugged grandeur of the Rockies—is reached by the Great Northern Railway from Glacier Park Station at which point the Railway Company has constructed a hundred thousand dollar hotel. Automobile roads have been built from this entrance and from Belton, western entrance, through the Park. A detour may be made from either entrance, or going in at one and coming out at the other.
