Guide Rock Young Man
Shot By "Tourists"

On last Saturday night a "tourist" outfit consisting of John Piper, Lizzie Pound, and Mr. and Mrs. Earl, who were traveling thru the country in a covered wagon "camped" on the banks of the Republican river south of Guide Rock. Rueben Dunbar and several more of the young men from that place visited the outfit about one o'clock Sunday morning and he got into an argument with one of them and a row was started and this young man was shot in the forehead by one of the occupants of the wagon. Sheriff Hedge was notified by phone and he accompanied by Marshal Christy, Ed Amack and Mr. Francis left for the scene of the shooting. The outfit had left the place where they had been camping and Sheriff Hedge and his men immediately began searching for them. The two women and one of the men were overtaken northeast of Guide Rock and placed under arrest. The other man got away from the wagon and was caught near Postwick.

Sheriff Hedge and Marshal Christy brought the two men up and lodged them in jail. Messrs. Ball and Zeigler of Guide Rock chaperoned the women up from that place and lodged them in jail.

The young man who was shot was not injured very much but had a very narrow escape from crossing the silent river.

The preliminary hearing will be held today. Government Inspector Wilson of Lincoln will be in the city today and the prisoners will be turned over to the government men on the charge of white slavery and will be taken to Hastings for their hearing in the federal court.

Visit School in District 58

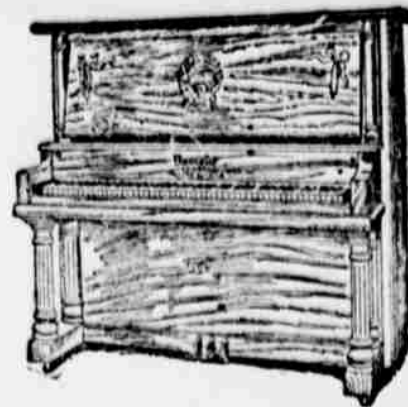
Miss Gertrude L. Coon and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Boehr were guests at District No. 58 on Wednesday, May 12th. During the noon hour a hot lunch was served to the guests and pupils by the teacher and girls in the seventh and eighth grades. The preparation for this had been made by the girls earlier in the day. The menu was as follows: Beef stew and potatoes; bread and butter sandwiches; olives; gelatine salad with whipped cream; wafers; oranges; mints.

District No. 58 is an Associate Rural Agriculture School. The work in manual training, agriculture and domestic science is supervised by those in charge of the work in the Red Cloud High School. The sum of \$50 is given by the state each year to schools carrying on this work. The money is to be spent in purchasing books, tools and other equipment for this work.

Miss Smith endeavors to serve one warm thing each noon, in addition to the lunch the children bring from home. This warm dish is prepared and served by the girls. The children sit quietly at their seats during the lunch period, then asking to be excused, pass quietly out to play.

This plan for lunch is an immense improvement over the former plan in which children scattered crumbs every where and invariably disposed of their lunch in from two to three minutes.

Miss Smith is to be complimented upon the improved appearance of the grounds and buildings. A fine garden has been made by the pupils. New swings and a croquet set have been put out, and flowers planted.
