Prized Relics for Museum.

The collection of Egyptian antiquities in Dundee museum has just been enriched by a selection of interesting articles presented by the Rev. Dr. Colin Campbell. In a letter to the committee, Doctor Campbell said that he could vouch for all the articles being genuine, as he had got most of them himself, and they were found at Thebes. Included in the gift are nine inscribed funeral cones, 18 ostraca, or potsherds, consisting of letters, petitions, receipts for taxes, contracts, accounts, etc., written with black ink in Coptic and Demotic, several fragments and strips of mummy linen cloth, inscribed in hieratic writing to serve as charms for the deceased, and other similar objects.

Notice of Special Bond Election

SCHOOL BONDS

Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Education of the School District of the City of Red Cloud, in Webster County, Nebraska, (being School District No. 2 of said county), at the regular meeting August 2, 1915.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of said school district that a special election is called to be held on September 8, 1915, in and for said school district, the polling place to be at the Firemen's Hall in Red Cloud, and the polls open between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m. of said day, at which election there is submitted to the said voters, who may cast their ballots thereon, the following proposition:

Shall the Board of Education of the said School District of the City of Red Cloud, in the county of Webster in the State of Nebraska be authorized to issue and negotiate the bonds of said school district, to be known as the High School Bonds of said district, in the aggregate sum of \$25,000.00, to be issued in denominations from \$50 to \$500 each, payable to bearer, bearing annual interest at 5 per cent per annum, represented by coupons attached to the bonds and to be issued and dated November 1, 1915, maturing twenty years after said date, but payable at the option of said district at any interest payment date after five years, and payable at the office of the state treasurer of Nebraska.

Said bonds to be offered on the open market and sold to the highest bidder for not less than par value, with accrued interest, and may be offered in separate amounts or lots, and the proceeds thereof to be used only for the purpose of erecting, furnishing and finishing a High School building, for said district upon the block of ground now occupied by, and to take the place of the present high school building, known as the "Washington School."

And shall the Board of Education, or other proper legal authority cause to be levied annually upon the taxable property in said district a tax sufficient in addition to all other taxes, to pay the interest on said bonds as the same mature, and to provide a sinking fund for the payment of the principal by the final maturity thereof.

The form of ballot to be used at said election shall be as follows:

HIGH SCHOOL BOND PROPOSITION
Vote for one.
For High School bonds and tax..... ()
Against High School bonds and tax..... ()
And to be voted and marked by making a cross in the usual manner in the space provided for that purpose.

Should a majority of the votes cast at said election be in favor of said proposition, then the Board of Education of said School District of Red Cloud City, will be authorized to issue and negotiate said bonds as specified, all as contemplated by Section 671 Revised Statutes, 1913, as amended by law 1915, Chapter 121, and it shall be the duty of the president and secretary of said board to execute the said bonds. The proceeds thereof shall be deposited with the treasurer of said district and kept by him in a separate fund, known as the High School Bond Fund, and paid out only upon warrant ordered by the Board of Education, for said specified purpose.
