L. P. Albright Dies In Omaha Monday

On last Monday evening at a hospital in Omaha, L. P. Albright, who was taken there about two weeks ago for medical treatment, died after a sickness of several months duration.

Mr. L. P. Albright was born March 17, 1851 in Millin County, Pennsylvania, and was 64 years old.

He came to this county in 1878, and immediately became one of the leading factors in the public life of the community. He was one of the organizers of the second bank in the city, and was one of the builders of the State Bank building, in which for a number of years he acted as cashier. He was republican in politics, and was active in matters pertaining to the government of the city, county and state. He served several years as state bank examiner, performing the duties of that office with zeal and efficiency. He was especially active in the religious life of the county, and was enthusiastic in Sunday school work. He was for several successive terms President of the State Sunday School Association, and the ability with which he presided over that body was attested by his repeated elections. He was a member of the A. O. U. W., of the Masonic fraternity, and of the M. E. Church, but during the last few years his principal support was given to the Congregational people.

Probably more than any other man in the city he visited the houses of mourning in this county, and consoled the stricken and bereaved. How much he will be missed in the future cannot well be estimated. How much his presence has soothed in the past may not be easily measured. He will be long remembered by grateful thousands, who will recall the many acts and words of kindness which he freely gave while living, and whose memory will be an enduring memorial of his service and character.

In the year 1880 he was united in marriage to Miss Eugenia Sherwood and to this union were born two children, Sherwood Albright of Omaha and Miss Ione of this city who together with two brothers and five sisters survive him.

The remains were brought to this city Wednesday evening and funeral services will be held at the home Friday afternoon at 2:30.

Paul Francis, the popular salesman for Swift & Co., returned Sunday from St. Joe where he had been spending a few days.

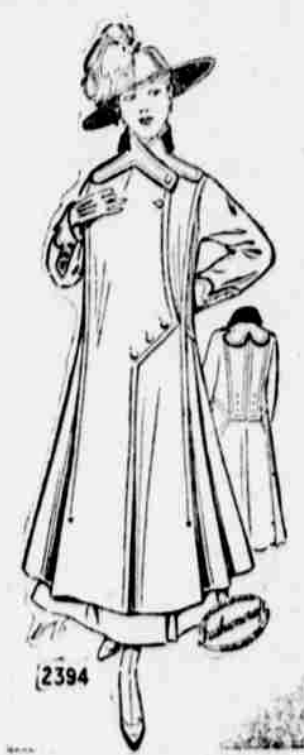
