Teachers' Institute Will Be Held August 14 to 19

The Webster County Teacher's Institute, which will be conducted by Miss Gertrude L. Coon, County Superintendent, will be held in the court house, Red Cloud, Nebraska, August 14 to 19. An able corps of instructors have been secured for this event, including Miss Alice Florer, of Kearney, who has spent the past year in Columbia University. She has shown her ability in institute work; Mr. Leslie Sipple, in charge of the rural school department in the Kearney Normal and Dr. A. A. Winship, of Boston, Mass., editor of the Journal of Education and a noted educator, author and lecturer. Lectures will be given on the following subjects: Community leadership, correlation, concrete teaching, standards in measurement, socialized recitation, geography, history, nature study, and practical arithmetic. A large attendance is predicted for this institute.
