

### Equalization Board Makes Tax Levy for 1916

RED CLOUD, NEB., Aug. 23, 1916. The County Board of Equalization met pursuant to call of Clerk. Members present T. J. Chaplin, Floyd McCall, Grant Shidler, J. J. Garber and Paul Storey, Chairman of said board. W. G. Hoffman and J. O. Butler, absent.

In the matter of making levies for the year 1916.

It was moved and seconded that the following taxes be and are hereby made on all Real and Personal property of Webster County, Nebraska, viz:

Four and one half mills on the dollar, assessed valuation for general fund including Soldiers Relief.

Three and one half mills on the dollar, assessed valuation for Real fund. Four mills on the dollar, assessed valuation for bridge fund and as an emergency exists. It was moved and seconded that one mill on the dollar, assessed valuation be levied and assessed as an Emergency Bridge fund, the above and foregoing motions were carried.

On motion levies were made on the assessed valuation for school and bond purposes for the several school districts.

The State Board of Equalization certified the State levy as follows:

General Fund.....	34 mills
University Fund.....	1 mill
Special University Building Fund	.75 mill
Normal School Fund.....	.85 mill
State Aid Bridge.....	.10 mill

Total..... 6.10 mills  
Total State and County Levy \$100 per \$100.

Board adjourned sine die.

### Bonds Carry by Large Majority

A special election was held in this city on Tuesday of this week to decide whether or not a sewer system shall be installed in the city with the result that the voters decided in favor of the proposed system, by a majority of 16%.

Now that the system is assured, the next step to be taken is to place on sale the bonds, the sum of which is not to exceed ten thousand dollars and are to be in denominations of five hundred dollars each, bearing not to exceed five per cent interest, and due twenty years after date, with the option of payment any time after five years.

Until these bonds have been disposed of, nothing more can be done in the way of letting the contracts for the construction of the sewer. There is no doubt that it will be but a matter of a very short time until the bonds have been taken up and work begun on the project.

The voters are to be congratulated upon their good judgment in voting in favor of the proposed improvement.


