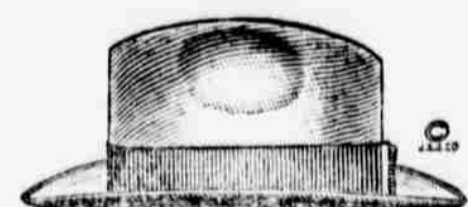

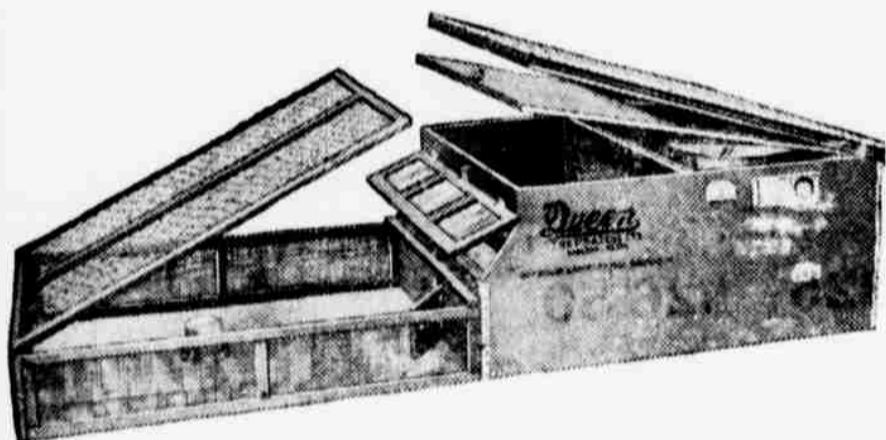

#### Rural Life Conference Meets at Lincoln

Zora Shields urges the use of the library. She says the average pupil knows nothing of notes or cross references. She closed with the following quotations: "Value of books overestimated but value of reading books underestimated." The greatest work of the school is to fit the child to educate himself.

To the statement that rapid readers are more accurate in getting the thought from the page than are slow readers the following proof was offered: "The rapid reader is the better interpreter because the sentence is the unit of thought. The mind, therefore passes more rapidly and readily from phrases or clauses to meanings than it does from a single word." Slow plodding is usually the result of a child's early training. If the child learns to read in small units the habits is likely to persist throughout life. In the case of the slow reader the habit is accentuated in the high schools where the study of foreign languages perpetuates the tendency to dwell upon words.

Relative to school gardening the following thoughts were given: "Production is the greatest measure of results in school gardening. The producing child is the one who is really being educated." Teachers should teach the worthwhileness of gardening, of production. She can do it best by setting an example. The high cost of living is likely to result in some good by making people appreciate the worthwhileness of production.

"The school garden to be effective must teach the child good business methods and thrift. This can not be done where the cost of plowing the land, seeds and prizes are paid by someone else. The child should learn that he earns what he labors for and no more. Mr. Lindeman believes cash prizes to be one of the most serious drawbacks this movement encounters. It makes the child try to get the prize at any cost, even lying."

Attendance at educational meetings and systematic professional reading are two potent factors by which a teacher can improve her teaching. Educational meetings are stimulating with a call to action. The pupil gets a real benefit from the teacher's attendance. The same is true from her systematic professional reading. Dr. Subrie says that "A reading teacher is a growing teacher. Multitudes of young teachers—and some older ones—are falling a sleep professionally just because they have a "certificate to teach" and a reasonable tenure. This professional work is a means to greater teaching skill, larger influence in the community, more certain and rapid promotion, and better than all else it gives the teacher the satisfaction

which comes from professional achievement and from conscious professional growth."

The Red Cloud Study Center met at Red Cloud Friday night. An excellent meeting is reported. The state professional reading course is carried out at these meetings under the direction of Prof. McCracken of Hastings College.

Irene Pegg has received a Certificate of Achievement for both the sewing and the cooking course.

Raymond Mercer of district 66 won first place in the Corn-Growing Project and Newton Crowell of district 49 won second place.

The District Associations meet March 28, 29, 30. Two of them are within easy reach of Webster county teachers. One is at Hastings and the other at Holdrege.
