

Mrs. Levings Wins State Women's Title Defeats Mrs. Johnson

Omaha Field Club Golfer Ends Match on Twelfth Hole; Beats Fremont Representative 7 and 6

The 1922 state women's golf championship crown still adorns the brow of an Omaha Golfer. Mrs. Mark M. Levings of the Omaha Field club is the proud possessor of the crown emblematic of the championship of the fifth annual Nebraska state women's golf tournament staged this week over the course of the Happy Hollow club.

Mrs. Levings defeated Mrs. C. N. Johnson, representing the Fremont Country club of Fremont, Neb., 7 and 6 to go in one of the shortest championship contests staged among women on record in this state.

In winning the honors, Mrs. Levings gains possession of a handsome trophy cup. The runner-up was awarded a suitable prize by the Nebraska State women's golf association.

The new champion succeeds Mrs. H. L. Arnold, also of the Omaha Field club, who won the title last season by defeating Mrs. Karl Langinger. Mrs. Levings eliminated Mrs. Arnold, 7 and 6 to go, Thursday morning.

Mrs. Levings played almost faultless golf yesterday afternoon in defeating her plucky opponent. The new champion, with steady brains of playing, was no match for the Fremont golfer, who had trouble with her drives after the first hole.

The Omaha woman was cool throughout the match and undisturbed by the fact that Mrs. Johnson seldom hooked a drive and her approach shots were nothing short of spectacular for a woman golfer. She was as cool as the proverbial cucumber while putting, and taking everything into consideration, played a brand of golf that was hard to beat.

Mrs. Levings won the first five holes and turned in a card for the first nine holes of 43 strokes, being six above par for the outside. Mrs. Johnson traveled the outside in 53 and was five down when she turned her footsteps toward the home green.

The champion made six par holes, four on the outside and two coming in. Mrs. Johnson collected but one par count, that being registered on No. 6 hole when both contestants shot threes and halved the tin.

Mrs. Johnson experienced great trouble in making the drive straight. The out-state golfer's drive was either hooked or fell short of her opponent's. Especially was this true on No. 4 when she required a seven to Mrs. Levings's 5. Mrs. Johnson topped her drive and a second attempt at smacking the white pellet resulted in a great big slice. She took three more whacks at the ball and was on the green in 5 and took two putts for a seven.

Mrs. Levings made a dandy drive for No. 4 and was on the green about 11 feet from the cup in four. She took the hole with a five after making a long putt that brought rounds of applause from the gallery. It was such playing as this that defeated Mrs. Johnson.

After the fifth hole, Mrs. Johnson started to stage a comeback. Her driving improved and her approach shots were better. The sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth holes were halved, but the handicap of being five down to Mrs. Levings was too much for the Fremont golfer.

Mrs. Levings increased her lead on No. 10 when she put the hole in four, which was par. Mrs. Johnson took a five. The eleventh was halved and the match ended on No. 12 when Mrs. Levings took two putts for a five on a par five hole, while Mrs. Johnson required a six.
