Exports to Europe Show Sharp Slump

Trade for Fiscal Year Over \$1,000,000,000 Below Figures of Previous Period.

Washington, Aug. 11.-Exports to Europe during the fiscal year ended June 30 were more than \$1.000. shipments to South America showed a decline of more than \$300,000. 000, the Commerce department an-Exports to Europe during the year aggregated \$2,067,000,000, compared with \$3,408,000 during the previous year. Imports totalled \$830,000,000 against \$938,000,000 during 1921.

Exports to South America for the year aggregated \$191,000,000 compared with \$523,000,000 during the \$289,000,000 against \$485,000,000 for
