

Daugherty Orders Investigation of Stalled Trains

Federal Attorney Instructed to Probe Action of Brotherhoods for Signs of "Conspiracy."

Washington, Aug. 13.—(By A. P.)—The federal district attorney in southern California was ordered by Attorney General Daugherty to investigate "whether the abandonment of trains on the Santa Fe railroad was the result of a conspiracy by those operating them or others to interfere with interstate commerce and the handling of the mails."

If the proof is sufficient, present the matter to grand jury immediately, said Mr. Daugherty's order. "If grand jury not in session, present to court the necessity of calling special grand jury."

Action by the Department of Justice followed investigation of press reports of the being up of trains. It has been reported to this department from certain places, especially in southern California and Arizona, on the Santa Fe, said Mr. Daugherty, "that trains have been abandoned by trainmen and employees."

Conspiracy Indicated. Department will give you all necessary support and assistance. The interference with and abandonment of trains strongly indicates the existence of a conspiracy and the government will take all necessary steps to prevent its continuation or like conspiracies elsewhere. "H. M. DAUGHERTY." "It is reported that 12 passenger and mail trains on the Santa Fe line in southern California are delayed because of the refusal of the men of the 'Big Four' to move them. The reason given for each action was the danger to members from armed guards and defective engines. Seven trains were held up at Needles, three at Barstow and two at Los Angeles. Hand grenades were thrown into the Santa Fe stockade at San Bernardino early this morning and an engine was run into a roundhouse turntable pit."

Nebraska University Among List of Schools Seeking \$118,760,800 for Stadiums.

Campaigns for funds conducted by alumni of American colleges, either now in progress or recently completed, total \$118,760,800. This information was secured through the investigation of the Ohio University Alumni association which is now raising \$300,000 for a war memorial.

Nearly every state and private institution has raised a fund, there being only three endowed colleges in the country which have not engaged in a large campaign.

Twenty-six universities and colleges are now building war memorials. Missouri valley colleges and universities which are showing Nebraska the way in this patriotic and loyal movement are Kansas university, Kansas Agricultural college, Iowa State Agricultural college, Iowa State university. Others with whom Nebraska likes to rank herself are Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Purdue and Michigan.

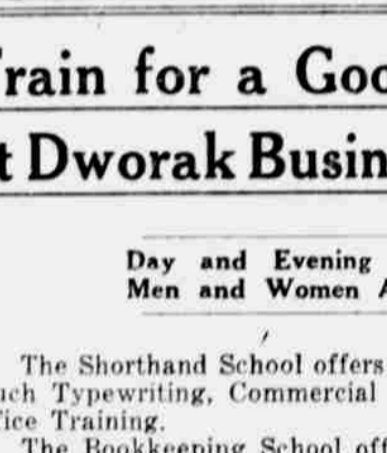
