

Omaha's Loss in Miners' Strike Set at \$1,000,000

Dealers Say Closing of Kansas and Illinois Fields Boosts Price \$2 a Ton Here.

"Why worry about coal during this period of excessive heat?" asked a man who was wearing earmuffs last February. Omaha's annual coal order calls for nearly 2,000,000 tons, which includes coal of all kinds and for all uses. This amount of coal would require a string of railroad cars extending from Omaha to Chicago. Approximately 500,000 tons are used for domestic purposes in homes. The municipal water plant, Nebraska Power company and the street railway company normally use more than 250,000 tons of steam coal in a year.

\$1,000,000 Loss. "How much has the coal strike cost Omaha since the men went out last April?" was a general coal dealer's question. "It is anybody's guess, but agreed that \$1,000,000 would be an approximation. It is impossible to define this loss in exact terms. Ordinarily steam coal sent to this market comes from the Colorado and Illinois fields, both of which have been closed during the strike. During this summer some steam coal has been received from Colorado and New Mexico, costing the Omaha buyer \$2 to \$3 per ton more than the normal cost of Kansas and Illinois steam coal. This situation has resulted in extra expense of nearly \$500,000 to Omaha since April 1, according to an estimate of one dealer.

Paying Heavy Premium. "I would venture to say that Omaha has been paying a premium of \$3.00 to \$4.00 a day for steam coal since the strike on account of our normal steam coal sources being closed," said Randall K. Brown. "Steam coal is costing \$8 to \$9 per ton, as against \$5 to \$6 before the strike. It will be September 1 at the earliest, in my judgment, before resumption of operations could be reflected in Omaha. There will be coal for everybody, but all will not be able to get just the coal they want. We don't know what disposition will be made of Illinois coal for a while after the miners resume operations."

R. C. Goddard explained that 85 per cent of domestic coal used in Omaha normally comes from the Illinois fields and most of the steam coal from Kansas fields, neither having been signed up as yet.

Using Oil. "The normal consumption of steam coal is being affected by the recent introduction of oil-burning apparatus under the boilers of various large utilities and industries. The municipal water plant is consuming 70 tons of steam coal a day by using 10,000 gallons of oil each day under four boilers at the Florence pumping station. This plant will continue to use oil as long as oil is cheaper. Similar situations exist at the plants of the Nebraska Power company and the street railway company. The power company is using oil for three-fourths of its normal fuel supply, which means 100 tons of steam coal per day now being used as against 400 tons before. The traction company is using 40 per cent oil and 60 per cent coal. Power company officials stated that it is probable they will use oil for several months at least."
