

System of Short Time Credits for Farmer Proposed

Former Head of War Industries Board Urges Scheme to Meet Exigencies of Agricultural Operations.

By GEORGE F. AUTHIER. Washington, Sept. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—A new system of short time credits for farmers has been presented to the senate agricultural bloc by Bernard M. Baruch, former head of the war industries board. Mr. Baruch's system is distinct from the federal farm board system and aims to meet the great need of the farmer, which is short-time credits which will enable him to meet the exigencies of his farming operations in spite of the long time required for him to turn over his product.

RADIO Grid Increases Sensitiveness

Connection of Grid Leak Should Be Made Across Condenser, Says Radio Expert.

The sensitiveness of operation of vacuum tubes designed for common usage is greatly increased by inserting a small condenser in multiple with a high resistance in series in the grid circuit. The character of grid control is dependent directly upon the bias potential maintained upon the grid. The necessary bias potential for varied conditions of use may be obtained either by tapping one terminal of the grid circuit from a fixed resistance in series with the filament rheostat, through which filament current flows, or by employing a "grid leak" connected across the grid condenser, or between the grid and the filament.

H. H. N., Lincoln, Neb.—Q. Explain fully the use of the word "heterodyne." A. "Heterodyne" in the terminology of radio is an audible beat. This beat is introduced as a secondary radio frequency oscillation in the receiving circuit, produces a beat of "difference" frequency which is the difference between the received signal and the "artificial" frequency. Dr. Fessenden invented this system.

United Thank Offering of Protestant Episcopal Members Taken at Portland Convention.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 8.—(By A. P.)—Women of the Protestant Episcopal church in the United States, at their united thank offering, which is a feature of each triennial convention, at the communion services today gave \$669.125 according to official announcement made last night with accustomed ceremony at a mass meeting.

The house of deputies, in triennial session today, adopted a resolution urging all people to pray in the interest of world peace. Ira W. Stratton of Reading, Pa., who introduced the resolution, recommended its passage in line with suggestions made by Canadian bishops who had addressed both houses of the convention in joint session.
