

Witness of War Brutality Dies in Hospital Here

Private Alfred P. Peterson-Rau, 23, 2210 Landon court, one of the chief witnesses against "Hard-Boiled" Smith of the United States army, who was sent to Leavenworth for cruelty to prisoners overseas, died yesterday afternoon at the Frederick hospital. Acute dilation of the heart caused death. The soldier is believed to have contracted rheumatism in the front line trenches in France which took to his heart.

He died less than an hour after his mother, Mrs. Martin Christensen, and his sister, Mrs. Christine Yodal, 550 South Twenty-sixth avenue, had visited him at the hospital.

Assigned to Smith's Camp

After going through the St. Michael and Argonne-Meuse drives in France, Smith was assigned to the prison barracks in "Hard-Boiled" Smith's camp.

At the public investigation and trial of Smith on Governor's island, after the war, Rau was a chief witness, having testified that on two occasions he saw Smith kill two prisoners in camp.

Returned Officer's Blow

On another occasion, Rau testified, "Hard-Boiled" Smith compelled him to carry the murdered body of a prisoner out of camp. It was Rau that returned a well-aimed blow at Smith once, when the army officer struck him with a blackjack.

Young Rau was taken seriously ill two weeks ago and removed to the hospital Thursday night. Funeral services will be held at 3 Monday afternoon at Gentleman's funeral home, Thirty-fourth and Farnam streets. A firing squad will accompany the body to Forest Lawn cemetery.

Bondsman for Mayer

Is Rejected by Court

When William Mayer, alleged bad jumper, attempted to be released from jail yesterday under \$5,000 bond signed by Ben Handler, County Attorney, Shonell looked up Handler and found he is already on bonds to the extent of \$25,000. 


