

### Hoover Looks Out for Householder in Fuel Squabble

#### Secretary of Commerce Says People Must Be Protected—Question of Price Not Yet Settled.

Philadelphia, Sept. 8.—In the matter of anthracite coal distribution and prices for the same, "the householders must and will be protected," Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, declared last night at the conclusion of a hard coal conference of national significance. The question of price is yet to be decided, but Samuel D. Warriner, president of the Lehigh Coal and Navigation company and others who attended the meeting said there was no disposition among the "big operators" to seek "unfair" profits. The principal accomplishment of the meeting, according to W. D. B. Aney, chairman of the Pennsylvania fuel commission, who called it at the request of Secretary Hoover, was the appointment of a committee that will take immediate steps to survey the anthracite situation from the standpoint of distribution. Mr. Warriner emphasized that his committee would have nothing to do with the question of price fixing. That, he said, is the work of the fuel administrators and fuel commissions. Mr. Hoover indicated that it will

be largely the work of Mr. Aney and his colleagues on the Pennsylvania fuel commission to make a report suggesting fair prices at the next anthracite conference.

### Insurance Agents Start on Trip to Home Office

### U. P. Offer Inconsistent, Charge of Union Heads

The Union Pacific railroad's offer to restore pension rights but not seniority rights to striking shopmen is inconsistent, according to officers of the Union Pacific federation of shop crafts.

B. H. Furse, president of the federation, declared that "the pension rules make it impossible for the railroad to restore pension rights without also restoring seniority."

## Senator Borah's Stand on Injunction Praised

New York, Sept. 8.—"Senator Borah deserves the thanks of every liberty-loving American for his fearless criticism of the Daugherty-Wilkerson injunction," John O'Dowd, chairman of the central strike committee of the railway shoomen in the Metropolitan district, declared in making public Senator Borah's reply to O'Dowd's request that the senator start in motion machinery for the impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty and Judge Wilkerson.

Senator Borah's reply said he was "thoroughly in sympathy with any plans to preserve unhampered the guarantees found in our constitution." "Senator Borah has done more than any one man to make Daugherty eat his words," Mr. O'Dowd said. "The attorney general's retractions and sidesteps, however merely clinch the case for his impeachment. He has proven by his own admission that he violated the law and the constitution. He stands self-convicted as an enemy of the people, guilty of gross misconduct in high office."

### Mayor of Chappell Dies After Short Illness

Chappell, Neb., Sept. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—I. F. Frederick, 72, died at his home here after an illness of less than 24 hours. Mr. Frederick served as a member of the state legislature from Howard county and

was one of the promoters of this county. At the time of his death he was mayor of Chappell, being the first mayor elected by the people. He leaves a wife and two children, both married.

### Gordon Suffers Two Fires; Loss on Barn Is \$10,000

Gordon, Neb., Sept. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—The Gordon fire department answered two calls last night. The first, at 11:30, was the residence of John Dixon. The cause is unknown. The damage was not heavy. The second call, at 2 a. m., was the Ed Sevier feed and sales barn. The flames, whipped by a strong north-west wind, threatened a residence in the vicinity. The barn was a total loss, together with a small amount of hay, two horses, one cow and a quantity of harness. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, mostly covered by insurance. The cause has not been determined.

### Candidates for Governor Will Speak at Greeley Fair

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—Charles W. Bryan, democratic candidate for governor, will speak Thursday at the county fair at Greeley. Charles H. Randall, republican candidate for governor, will speak at Greeley Wednesday. Mr. Bryan stated today it was probable W. J. Bryan would begin stumping the state the second week in October.

### Veteran Falls City Editor Is Father of Baby Girl

Falls City, Neb., Sept. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—J. C. Davis, 72, former editor of the Falls City News, is the father of a newly born daughter. Mr. and Mrs. Davis now reside in Burlington, Colo., where they were married five years ago. Mrs. Davis before her marriage was Miss Shirley Woolcock and is about half the age of her husband.

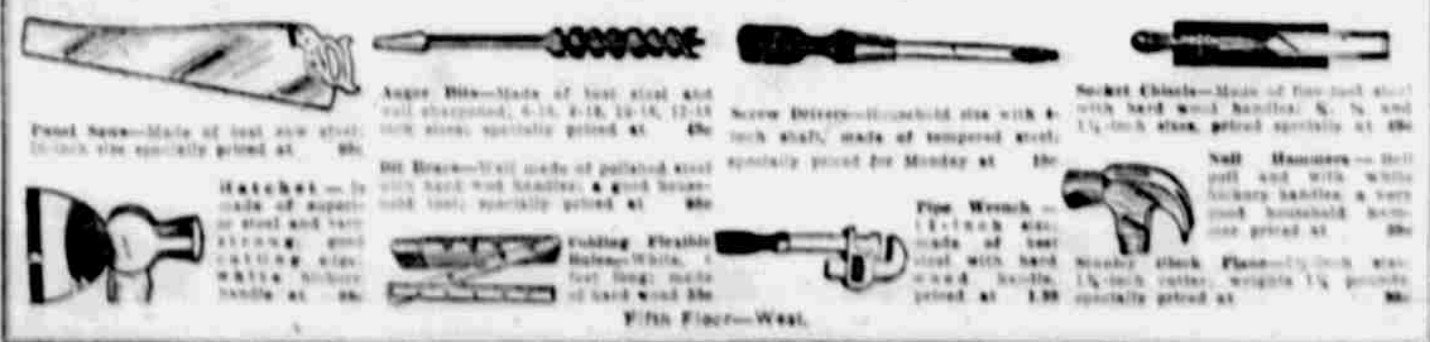
