The Country Club, Brookline, tass., Sept. 8.-Jesse Sweeter of New York, Metropolitan champion and Charles (Chick) Evans of Chicago, best of the west, will meet tonorrow to decide the national amateur golf championship for 1922. having advanced to the final round of the 26th U. S. G. A. tournament for the title today in semi-final matches. Bobby Jones of Atlanta, champion of the south, went down seven holes short of the 36-hole distance before

the sweeping and record-breaking strokes of Sweeter. The golfing ar-tistry of "Chick" Evans, which has brought him two national amateur and one national open title, the championship of France and leadership in the west, wa sexemplified snew at the expense of Little Rudy Knepper, his fellow westerner from Sioux City. This was the greater cefeat, 11 up and 9 to play, but the score of 8 up. 7 to play, by which ones fell on his fifth national amateur championship wayside, was the day's surprise.

It came, however, as no flake. The Metropolitan champion, a student at and former intercollegiate champion, played as none of the world's leading amateurs, competitors in this tourney, when he started, have played during the past week. Evans was peerless. Where Sweetser gained some of his advantage over Jones by chipping mashie nibicks to the cup, Evans played perfectly to the green and then perfectly to the cup.
