

### Rifle Firing Disturbs Irish Law Makers

Shots Strike Building Used by Provisional Parliament — Mail Strike Is Discussed.

Dublin, Sept. 14.—Rifle firing disturbed yesterday's session of the provisional parliament, a number of shots striking the buildings housing the national museum, where the legislature is sitting.

Referring to acts of violence in the postal strike, the postmaster general mentioned the firing upon the Amiens street offices. Labor Leader Johnson, in reply, said that the office was fired upon before the strike and as there was firing in the city tonight, it was not fair to attribute it to the strikers.

Two explosions emphasized his remarks. Later it was learned that bombs were thrown to a lorry filled with troops on the north side of Stephens Green, not far from Greaton street. The strikers fired upon their assailants who escaped. An armored car joined in the fusillade with a Lewis machine gun.

Outside the parliament a number of bullets struck the stone copings. They were fired high from buildings somewhere near, for it was impossible for them to have come from Stephens Green. No one was injured.

Early yesterday afternoon a bomb was thrown and shots fired at another car carrying troops. The attack occurred near O'Connell bridge. Two civilians were wounded by bomb fragments.

Parliament spent most of the time discussing the postal strike and aside from the labor bench, a number of delegates doubted the accuracy of the cost of living figures upon which the wage reductions were based. It seems likely that negotiations for a settlement will begin soon. A small amount of mail handled by the post-

### Mountain Lion Attacks Rider; Killed by Hounds

Callaway, Neb., Sept. 14.—(Special.)—Waldemar Bolowski, a young Russian, living 20 miles north of Callaway, while in a pasture came upon a full-grown mountain lion finishing breakfast of a 2-month-old calf it had killed. The mountain lion took after the shepherd dog which was following Bolowski and made short work of it. By this time the Russian thought he had better be getting toward home. He was about 200 yards in advance when the lion took after him. The lion caught him in a short time and made a grab for the horse's flank, tearing some skin loose with his large fangs. At this time several wolf hounds belonging to a neighbor came racing up and attacked the lion. Two of the dogs were killed and the other three were badly bitten and cut up, but they managed to kill the lion.

### Iowa Murderer Faces Death With Nerves of Steel

Eugene Weeks, Slayer of Des Moines Grocer, Fails to Collapse — Reconciled to Wife.

Fort Madison, Ia., Sept. 14.—(By A. P.)—His nerves steeled against the ordeal which he must undergo tomorrow noon when he will be led from the death cell to the gallows, Eugene Weeks, convicted of the murder of George Fosdick, Des Moines grocer, paced his cell in murderer's row at the state prison here today.

The Des Moines man, expected by many to break under the strain and the silence of the empty cell of Ira Pavey, who was hanged last Friday, is displaying remarkable nerve. Weeks appears less worried today than he has for several days, according to Warden T. Hollowell.

Visited by Wife. Mattie Weeks, wife of the condemned man, arrived here yesterday and went to the prison where she spent most of the day with her husband. A reconciliation between the couple took place. Weeks had not seen his wife since the days of his trial when she testified against him and later attempted to collect the \$2,500 reward offered for his conviction.
