

Reunion of Vets Leads to Many Happy Meetings

Sergeant and Colonel Who Met Just Once Before, on Battle Line, Recognize Each Other.

Eighty-ninth divisioners, in reunion here, attended the running races at Ak-Sar-Ben field yesterday afternoon, meeting at the Auditorium at 1, and going to field in chartered cars.

Visiting members were unanimous in praising the entertainment furnished by their Omaha buddies. Failure of Governor McKelvie to arrive led to a cancellation of the program at the Auditorium yesterday morning.

The reunion has led to many happy meetings. Among them is one related by Sergt. C. B. Bull of Elkhorn, Neb., formerly of Company D, 355th infantry, Col. Burton Smead and Sergt. Bull had met just once before. That was in France in the thick of battle. The sergeant was in charge of his company. The colonel ordered him to advance. They met again at the barbecue Thursday. Each recognized the other instantly and talked happily over the incident.

Little groups of men met last night for the last time for two years, until the next reunion.

In the picture at the right are a few members of the 89th division's hall of fame.

C. H. Turner, Aurora, Mo., lower right, whose right arm and right leg were badly torn by a shell explosion, and whose head was wounded on the

right side on October 24, 1918, in the Argonne in France.

Turner was thought to be fatally injured. While being taken to a hospital he was gassed. He fooled the surgeons by recovering, however, and is taking lively part in the 89th division reunion here.

Turner agrees with Sherman's definition of war, but even peace has its difficulties. He injured his right arm while throwing a baseball at the reunion field day and barbecue Thursday afternoon in Elmwood park.

"But what's a mere sprained arm?" smiled Turner, who was in Co. H, 354th infantry, during the conflict.

"They're the finest nurses in the world," grinned J. V. Walker, Plattburgh, Mo., who lost his right leg in the Argonne engagement.

Walker was entirely surrounded at Elmwood park Thursday by the three women who nursed him back to health in base hospital 49, ward 14.

"And he was a good patient, too," rejoined the three nurses.

Walker and the three nurses met in Omaha Thursday for the first time since they were in Europe. They had a little reunion all their own, and a happy one it was.

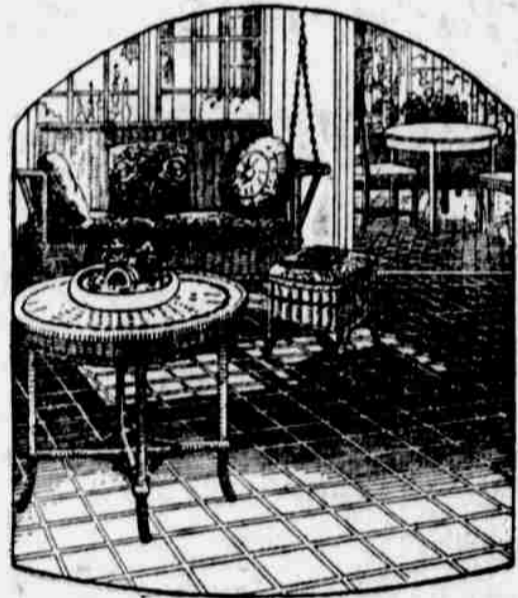
