

G. O. P. Blamed for Low Prices of Farm Products

Campaign Speeches of Nebraska Senator Depict Dark Future Unless He Is Re-Elected.

Hayes Center, Neb., Sept. 29.—(Special Telegram.)—Asserting that republicans are directly chargeable with the low prices of farm products today, and that as a result of the enactment of the new tariff law everything the people buy will be decidedly higher, Senator Hitchcock, democratic nominee for a third term in the United States senate, criticized everything republican and pictured a sorrowful future for the people of Nebraska and the nation.

Speeches were made today at Cambridge, Indiana, Culbertson and Hayes Center. The Cambridge meeting was not on the schedule, but by arrangement, a short speech was made there to a few gathered on the set corners.

Outlook Is Dark.

The senator recounted that the number of commercial failures that had occurred in 1922 were 27,000, about the same number last year, and predicted that the number of business failures during the next year would be fully as great as during the last two years. The senator could see no hope on the horizon for improved conditions, so he said, unless democratic senators are returned to Washington, and the lower house made democratic this year.

As one of the fundamental reasons why he should be given a third term, it was urged that a new senator, especially one from a western state such as Nebraska, would have great difficulty in being recognized by the powers in Washington, and that until he had served a long time, a new senator could not be of much service to the nation.

The liquor issue continued to receive pointed attention from Hitchcock again today, and it was commonly remarked by those in the audience that there is more interest in the liquor question today than at any time.

Wets are Hopeful.

The wets, so it is reported, are hopeful that the supreme court has made it possible that eventually the manufacture of light wines and beer will be legalized, while the dries are determined to trust no man who at heart is wedded to a light wine and beer program.

"Such a man," say the dries, "will not work for the dry cause even though he may dodge voting on the subject."

Deflation continued to be numbered among the questions discussed by the senator. He reiterated that the federal reserve banking system is a great benefit to the banking interests, but he has not been able to explain, so it is said, why the law enacted by democratic congress and operated by a majority of democrats failed to make good in agriculture. He declared that the board, or the system, has been captured by enemies of the federal banking system.
