

Boy Drowned in Attempt to Save Life of Brother, 6

9-Year-Old Lad Tightens Lips and Plunges Into Water in Attempt to Save Child.

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Under the black waters of a deep quarry at Bolton today was the body of little John Konnie, 6. On a cold slab in the village morgue lay the body of his 9-year-old brother, Joe.

The boys at Bolton regarded the quarry pit as "bottomless" but Young John was a fearless swimmer. Against the admonition of Joe and their parents, John grimaced and dived. Only a few bubbles came up. "Joe, I'm scared to go in there," said Joe. His lips tight, he hesitated but an instant as he balanced on the edge of the steep quarry wall and plunged in after his brother.

Rescuers found Joe's body an hour later.

An Old Fashioned Boy.

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Walter Tietz, 17, was an old fashioned boy who cared for no companionship except that of his mother and his dog. Walter's mother died last Christmas Eve and he bore his sorrow until last night. Then he carefully locked his dog outside the kitchen and turned on the gas. Physicians said he might recover.

Two Poisoned By Corn.

Miller City, Mont., Oct. 4.—Two residents of the Cabin Creek district, north of Baker, Mont., are dead from poisoning believed to have resulted from eating preserved corn.

The dead are Miss Pearl Walden, 20, a school teacher, and Adolph Nitschka, 22, a rancher.

L. D. S. Membership Passes 100,000 Mark

Independence, Mo., Oct. 4.—Special—The report of the department of statistics to the general conference of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, in session here, show the baptism of nearly 1,160 converts since the last conference early in 1920. The total membership of the church is 100,854, of which over 2,000 are in Australia, an equal number in the British Isles, and a slighter distribution over other foreign missions.

The business of the conference today was at a standstill because the quorums to whom had been submitted yesterday the "revelation" received by the president of the church, are still debating the document in their private sessions, and are not ready to have it come before the body for endorsement. Before any revelation becomes a law unto the church, it must be approved by the various quorums of ministers, and then by the delegate body in conference assembled.

The department of women, supervised by Mrs. Dora Glines of Independence, had the forenoon session today, following a series of institute classes at the Stone church. The speakers of the day and evening have been William Patterson of Australia, Apostle J. Frank Curtis of Independence, and Walter Wayne Smith, general church historian.

Body of Slain Minister

Will Be Exhumed Today

New Brunswick, N. J., Oct. 4.—County Prosecutor Stricker was informed late yesterday that an order directing trustees of Greenwood cemetery, Kings county, New York, to allow exhumation of the body of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, who with his choir leader, Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, was murdered September 16, had been signed by Supreme Court Justice O'Malley, in Manhattan.

The order, it was said, directed that the body be removed to the Kings county hospital morgue, where an autopsy was to be performed by surgeons of Middlesex and Somerset counties, New Jersey, and Dr. Otto Schutze, chief medical examiner for the district attorney's office in New York. The body of the slain preacher probably will be exhumed tomorrow.

Sale of Katy Postponed.

Dallas, Oct. 4.—The sale of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad has been postponed, according to unofficial reports of railroad officials both at Dallas and Denison last night. The official announcement of the postponement cannot be made until tomorrow, they said.

"Lone Rider" Lets Mayor Mount Brown Beauty, 'Pet'



Van Cleve Gulick, "the lone rider," started out from his home at Bennington, La., May 23, 1921, astride his 11-year-old brown mare, "Pet," determined to visit every state capital in the United States.

Vacuum Tube Sees Rapid Progress

Delicate Device Amplifies Feeble Signals and Generates High Frequency.

There has probably been no development in the art of radio which has been of such great importance or which has contributed to such rapid progress as the development of the vacuum tube. This device in various modifications has found a rather wide application.

Some of these applications are—to rectify feeble radio oscillating currents, to amplify very feeble signals, to generate high frequency for radio transmission, and to convert commercial frequency (60-cycle) alternating current to a direct current supply of voltage which may be used in the transmitting equipment or for charging storage batteries.

Construction of the Tube.

The vacuum detector tube, as marketed at the present time consists of three elements or electrodes called filament, grid, and plate. These are mounted and sealed in a glass bulb from which the air is exhausted to a relatively low pressure, and are connected by small wires to studs on the base of the bulb which serve as connecting terminals. The filament is a loop of small tungsten wire, each end of which is connected to a base stud. The grid is a rectangular coil of very fine wire close around the filament loop, and is connected by one wire to a base stud. The plate is an oval or

cylindrical form of thin sheet metal spaced uniformly around the grid.

Thus the inner element of the group is the filament and the outer element, the plate, and between these is the fine wire grid. A socket is used for mounting the complete vacuum tube in the same manner that a socket is used for an electric light bulb.

It is analogous to a rifle where the trigger corresponds to the grid and the explosives in the cartridge to the B battery. A slight amount of energy on the trigger controls a large amount of energy stored in the B bat-
