

Cosgrave Offers Amnesty to All Rebels in Ireland

Proclamation Gives Until October 15 for the Irregulars to Lay Down Their Arms.

Dublin, Oct. 4 (2 a. m.)—Amnesty to all irregulars who voluntarily surrender their arms and cease to engage in rebellious activities before October 15, was granted in a proclamation issued by President Cosgrave last night.

He stated that the government "knows that many are forced to operate against their will and better judgment and in some cases under the influence of persons who are not of our race, while others have come to realize that they have put their lands to the ruin of the motherland, and the government, moved by the hope of restoring peace without further bloodshed, therefore has decided that an opportunity will be offered even now to those who are willing to throw in their lot with the majority of their countrymen to withdraw from this rebellion with impunity to themselves."

It is understood that the government was informed indirectly of the willingness of leaders of a number of units to quit if they were not molested further.

The proclamation precedes the inauguration of the military courts and other more stringent measures.

The Irish parliament today adopted the clause of the new constitution containing the oath of allegiance.

Legion Members Discuss Change in Name of Post

Vote Will Be Taken at Next Meeting on Substitution of Omaha for Douglas County.

A heated discussion followed a proposal to change the name of the Douglas county post of the American Legion to Omaha post at the monthly meeting of the organization at the city hall Tuesday night. The change was proposed by the executive committee on the ground that other legion posts existed in the county.

J. R. Byerly started the argument by proposing that the post be given the name of a dead soldier. Among those who favored retention of the present name was W. J. Ritchie, retiring state commander of the legion, who said, "The history of the Douglas county post has already been written for three years. Why change it?"

The proposed amendment will be voted on at the next monthly meeting of the post, according to requirements of the constitution.

Brig. Gen. George B. Duncan, commanding officer of the Seventh corps area, made a short address on the opportunities and responsibilities of the legion.

Rev. Lloyd Holsapple, recently elected state chaplain, spoke of the relief work contemplated by the post. J. J. Jesse, captain of the post rifle team, which is to compete at the national convention at New Orleans, and Laurence Coy of Valley, new state vice commander, made a short address.

Announcement was made that the post band will give a concert at the Auditorium Wednesday, October 11, to obtain funds for a trip to the national convention.
