

### Roosevelt Holds Up G. O. P. Record Before Voters

#### Declares Administration Has Demonstrated Ability in Economy and Progressive Legislation.

Col. Theodore Roosevelt addressed a political rally in the Auditorium Wednesday night that reflected intense interest in the republican party of Omaha which also was a fine tribute to the distinguished speaker.

Four thousand persons listened attentively to Mr. Roosevelt's references to the records which he held up as evidence of democratic profligacy in governmental expenses as against republican economy and constructive legislation.

"Fellow republicans, I don't say 'ladies and gentlemen,' because the women are just as important now as the men," the colonel said in his brief preliminary remarks. "I take pride in the fact that the republican party was the primary agency in giving women the right to vote."

"When the republican party took over the government the country was confronted by two important problems—economy and constructive legislation. Things were in an awful mess, so we decided to examine all governmental affairs through the same pair of glasses we would use if it was our own business."

He referred specifically to what this examination disclosed in the Navy department which he is familiar. The result was surprising, he said. "We went on the rocks that we wouldn't keep any extra that didn't catch mice, so we examined the personnel and if we found a man who was not actually filling a job we returned him to civil life. What I say of the Navy department may be applied to every department. The total result was considerable."

"We worked out the same problem for the government collectively. Gen. Dawes handled that job well. He found each department working in isolation, instead of co-operation. It looked as if the government departments were operating as rival businesses. That condition has been removed; co-ordination and co-operation is the present order of things. This isn't very sensational, but it is practical, and we want practical government."

"For the last year of democratic control the appropriation for executive departments was \$5,492,999,999; last year our appropriation was \$5,400,000,000, practically one-half. In 1913, the national debt was \$260,000,000. Two years ago, when we got the country back from the democrats, it was \$24,000,000,000. Some of that large debt, of course, was legitimate, but 60 per cent was needless waste."

"When I took the 26th regiment of Infantry, First division, to Germany, the men's shoes were badly worn. English shoes were issued to those men who had been there the longest. After the war, countless contracts for armament were kept going. From November 14, 1918, to June 2, 1919, after the war, millions of gun shells were made even in factories of England and France. Also Howitzer carriages and other armaments of war. The interest of the national debt is now more than the sum total of the national debt when the democrats took over the government. Where does this billion dollars a year interest come from? It comes from the implements the farmers buy; from the shoes I buy for my children. We have reduced governmental taxes \$819,000,000 a year, revised the revenue act, reduced the national debt and governmental expenses."

#### Benefits of Tariff.

On the subject of the tariff Mr. Roosevelt said:

"I've said before that tariff is fine. We have a standard of living in this country that is higher than that of other countries. That is one of the strengths of our republic. The republic is dependent upon the work of all of the people and we must keep the average high. If our industries are left unprotected, the country would be flooded with products from abroad and the result would be that many of our people would be out of work. The tariff helps the farmers. Nebraska is a farmers' country and Omaha is dependent on the farmers. The tariff will help the farmers enormously. Men like Capper in the senate are satisfied with the way this tariff helps the farmers."

#### Limitation of Arms.

"Over and above all in importance was the limitation of arms conference with which it was my good fortune to work closely."

"The nations were running a race in naval armament when Harding began his presidency. This condition was imposing a terrific burden on the people and the money that was being spent was not tending to prevent war. Harding saw that, and he called the nations together, that they might all reduce together, for you know there is nothing in reducing arms. Mr. Hughes felt, and rightly, that the best chance of success was to get the plan home to the various nations. The Navy department worked secretly for three months on these plans which were presented to the conference on the opening day."

"The result of that conference was that we got a navy second to none in the world and equal to Great Britain, the proverbial mistress of the seas. And we got this at greatly reduced expense. We saved \$200,000,000 on construction. If we had carried out the building program then in contemplation it would have cost this country \$400,000,000 a year to maintain the navy. The per cent cost is about half that amount. I speak as one who has seen these deliberations, the idea that each country must have a navy sufficient for protection but not for aggression."

**Don't Want War.**  
"We don't want any more wars that can be properly avoided with honor. I don't want any wars for my back to go in that are not necessary. Europe has tried to prevent war by a balance of power, which was not satisfactory as the history of Eu-

### Teddy Sums It Up

When the democrats took over the national administration in 1912 the country had a national debt of some \$360,000,000; when they turned it back to the republicans eight years later the national debt was \$24,000,000,000; that's what THEY did. We declared peace with Germany; that's what WE did.

Hope shows. The new plan will act as a deterrent. I think this disarmament treaty has done more for peace than all the treaties signed during the last 100 years, but I don't want to tell you there will be no more wars. I do think we have reduced them very much. The countries have gotten together on this plan and that will be an incentive for them to get together on other plans. This is what the limitation of arms conference has accomplished; something that has never been accomplished before in the world's history.

#### Benefits of Administration.

"The republican party has worked hard, intelligently and earnestly, and has registered 99 per cent correct."

"We have reduced the national debt \$320,000,000 in the first year."

"The democratic party raised taxation; the republicans revised the revenue bill and reduced taxes \$819,000,000."

"I waited on your father during the big hunt in Oklahoma," said Mr. Burton, as he shook the hand of the son of his former employer.

Burton's face beamed. He explained that this was the first time he ever met the younger Roosevelt.

"I was glad to meet Col. Roosevelt because I knew his father, who always spoke to me when we met," said Mr. Burton. "I cooked for President Roosevelt and his party when they were hunting in Oklahoma. Al Jennings of Oklahoma City is a friend of mine, and he knew President Roosevelt who stayed at the Jennings home. I cooked chicken and beefsteak for the president on his hunts. I have been a camp cook for 25 years. I remember that President Roosevelt was fond of fresh buttermilk."

Col. Roosevelt said he was pleased to meet the man who had made good with his father as camp cook.
