### Magney Charged With Falsity by Candidate Beal

#### Women Voters Told Democratic Aspirant to County Attorneyship Is Utterly Inexperienced.

Henry Beal, republican candidate for county attorney, speaking yesterday afternoon before the League of Women Voters in the Y. W. C. A. building, charged his democratic opponent, Lloyd Magney, with attempting to mislead the voters by a false statement appearing on his campaign cards.

"The statement says 'Six years' experience in the county attorney's office,' but in fact Mr. Magney never had a day's experience in that office," said Mr. Beal. "He was never county attorney nor even a deputy county attorney. I want fairness in this campaign."

#### Find Large Stock.

Another raid led by John Mallon, Jr., and John McMillen, raided Jim Reed's place, 218 North Sixteenth street. Here they found nine gallons of gin, alcohol and moonshine whiskey and 417 quarts of beer.

#### Federal Prohibition Officers Led by H. C. Anderson, arrest eight persons, accompanied by City Detective Killian and Davis, raided apartments at 704 6-10 1/2 North Sixteenth street, arresting eight persons and seizing five gallons of liquor.

#### When the officers first entered the apartments they found four gallons of booze and arrested seven persons. While they were still there, a man came to the door carrying a box. When he knocked the sleuths let him in and arrested him also. A gallon of whisky was found in the box.

#### Salerno Is Bondsman.

The man gave his name at the police station as Fred Salerno, Sixth and Pierce streets. He told officers that Sebastian Salerno, brother of John Salerno who was slain Saturday night, would arrange bond for him. All eight prisoners are being held for federal authorities.

### Man and Woman Held in Bond Loss

#### Dakota Couple Alleged to Have Fled With \$7,000 in Securities.

N. J. Olson, state sheriff, Sioux Falls, S. D., and J. G. Coon, deputy state attorney, left Omaha Thursday night with Mrs. Kate Boyer, 41, who was arrested at the Loyal hotel with her husband, Oscar H. Boyer, barber, son of Mrs. George Warner, 2702 North Fifty-third street, on a charge of having embezzled an balice \$7,000 in Liberty bonds owned by E. E. Snyder, 72, neighbor of the Boyers in Sioux Falls.

Mrs. Boyer is alleged to have been given the bonds by Snyder with instructions to deposit them in the bank at Sioux Falls, where Boyer had a shop. When Snyder went to the bank a few weeks later, he learned they had not been deposited, the sheriff alleges. An attempt to have the woman return them, failed. Snyder alleged. Several days later Mr. and Mrs. Boyer disappeared, sending word to Snyder to meet them in Sioux City. The sheriff says he went with Snyder to Sioux City, but the Boyers did not meet them.
