

War-Torn Heroes of Seven Nations Urge World Peace

Veterans Journey to New Orleans in Organized Attempt to Make Ideals an Actuality.

New Orleans, Oct. 13.—(By A. P.)—Twenty-three war-torn soldiers from seven European countries reached here tonight, delegates to the convention of the Interallied Veterans Federation, which opens here Saturday and guests of the American Legion.

Most of them have sacrificed enough in war to incapacitate them forever from active service on the battle field; from the snowed-out reaches of the Balkans to the flat Belgian river Scheldt, these men have seen war in its grim actuality, and in defense to their home lands, have lost eyes, arms, scalps and health.

But it was evident that despite their hardships and their sacrifices, they have not forgotten how to smile, and their expressions were not those of men without hope. They have come to the convention indeed with a large hope—that of doing something to end war.

Some of them—those who were able—walked beside their American hosts, one man, Maj. J. B. E. Cohen, head of the British delegation, rode in a wheel chair. He had lost both legs. Another tall, gray-haired Briton, Capt. W. Appleby, walked, guided by his young daughter. He was wholly blind. It was a small delegation, but expressive.

Ahead of them, in the official cavalcade, rode an escort mounted police and a detachment of Boy Scouts bore the flags of the seven nations under which these 23 men went to war. Some of the veterans could see the flags and some could not.

At the city hall they were officially welcomed by Mayor Andrew McShane of New Orleans. Tomorrow the veterans, who stopped in Washington to leave a wreath at the shrine of the American Unknown Soldier, take up the work of their convention. It is being held to improve the conditions of veterans of the great war and to do what it may toward making the ideal of universal peace an actuality.

State Board of Education Elected by People and Federal School Aid Urged.

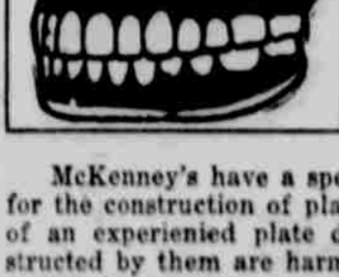

(Continued from Page One.) testimony, have slaughtered in cold blood 1,500,000 Armenians and 500,000 Greeks without any provocation at all.

At one point in his speech Mr. Lloyd George declared: "There has been speech after speech of intolerable abuse, and I am told to bear it like a Christian, but there are too many people about the world who think it is the business of Christians to be massacred by Turk or pro-Turk. I am not one of that sort of Christians."

Can't Bluff Fighting Animal. "If there is to be a change there is no man who would welcome it more than I. I have had a long spell and a very hard one. I love freedom. There are a lot of things I want to say."

This statement by the premier was after he had turned to home politics, a subject on which the whole empire was awaiting his pronouncement. He asserted there were "die hards" (the ultra conservatives) on both sides.

Mrs. George Stephens Asks \$15,000 for Lost Affections—Ran Household, Too, She Says.

Alleging that Newton Stephens, her father-in-law, dictated to her husband regarding all domestic matters, even to the purchase of groceries, Della M. Stephens is suing him for \$15,000 on the charge of alienating the affections of her husband, George Stephens, whom she married at Papillion, Neb., on April 26, 1919.

After expressing his love of freedom, saying that no one would want a change more than he, the prime minister added: "Three years ago I was anxious to go out and begged Mr. Bonar Law to take the office. He declined. I never sought the position. I never wished to remain in it. But I will serve my country in any capacity."
