

### One of Earliest Iowa Pastors, 103, Dies in Bluffs

Rev. G. G. Rice, Who Founded First Congregational Church in District, Succumbs.

Rev. G. G. Rice, 103, known as the father of Congregationalism in Council Bluffs and Omaha, died at 5 yesterday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. W. Olla, 506 East Pierce street, Council Bluffs.

The first Congregational church in this district was founded by Rev. Mr. Rice in 1851. After establishing it he served as pastor at Omaha, Ia., and Hiawatha, Kan., but returned eventually to Council Bluffs.

### Inland Press Association Opposes Free List Audit

Chicago, Oct. 18.—By unanimous vote, members of the Inland Daily Press association assembled here in

the last session of this year yesterday opposed audit of free circulation by the audit bureau of circulation. The resolution was offered by E. P. Adler of the Daytonport (Ia.) Times.

Members of the Inland Daily Press association are opposed to audit of free circulation because it destroys the purpose for which the audit bureau of circulation was formed—namely that of compiling an accurate account of the subscriptions enjoyed by each of its members, according to Russell D. Hainey of Decatur, Ill.

### Jury to Try Suit to Keep Mayfield's Name Off Ballot

Corsicana, Tex., Oct. 18.—The suit to make permanent the temporary injunction preventing Earle B. Mayfield's name being placed on the ballot as democratic senatorial candidate will be tried before a jury, Judge Hawkins Scarborough announced today. He overruled a motion by David R. Grammel, attorney for Mayfield, to postpone further hearing until the civil appeal court at Dallas had acted on the appeal now pending.

### Farmer First in Prosperity, Says President

To Lead in Getting Substantial Recognition in "New Era of Activity," Harding Declares.

Washington, Oct. 18.—Belief that the farmer will be among the first to get substantial recognition in a "new era of activity and prosperity," now on the way, was expressed by President Harding in a letter written to Secretary Wallace of the Agriculture Department and made public today at the White House. It was forwarded to the secretary to be read late today at a meeting of republicans at Washington Court House, O.

"Agricultural production is very nearly restored, taking the world as a whole, but agricultural prices are so low that it is apparent to all of us that the farmer is not being compensated," the president said. "The Washington administration has recognized this condition and has done everything in its power to restore a normal balance between prices and costs of production."

The executive further declared a great deal already had been accomplished toward that end and added that the trend was "strongly toward better conditions for the farmer."

The farmer was described by the president as a "captain of industry," the letter adding that elimination of competition among farmers would be impossible without sacrifice of the individualism that still keeps the farm the real reservoir from which the nation draws so many of the finest elements of its citizenship.

### Stillman Case Reopened by Unexpected Decision

Nyack, N. Y., Oct. 18.—By the unexpected action of Supreme Court Justice Arthur H. Tompkins in filing a decision which challenges the jurisdiction of the special term of the supreme court in White Plains, the Stillman case is suddenly reopened.

Automatically litigation between the New York banker and his wife is again begun by Justice Tompkins' decision and the case will be sent to the appellate division for determination of the jurisdictional question.

Justice Tompkins bases his decision upon an order obtained by Mr. Stillman's attorneys to show cause on October 5, why the referee's report should not come before him, rather than before Justice Morschauer, was sought by Mrs. Stillman's attorneys.
