

Hammond Named Chairman of U. S. Coal Commission

Leaders of Miners and Operators Invited to Attend Informal Conference With Members Next Week

Washington, Oct. 18.—The United States coal commission, created by congress to investigate and report on the facts on all phases of the coal industry, with recommendations for possible legislation or government regulation, at its first meeting today, organized by selecting John Hayes Hammond as chairman and laid out a program for future operations.

As a preliminary step, the committee telegraphed John E. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America; A. M. Tule, president of the National Coal association, representing Edmond operators, and S. D. Warriner, who has served as chairman of the policy committee of an operators' association, asking all three to attend informal conferences with the committee next week for the purpose of suggesting methods of procedure.

Call on Harding.

In addition, those invited were asked to suggest the names of representatives of their own associations, who might serve on committees to assist and cooperate with the association in its work.

After the meeting, Mr. Hammond, with his associates, George Otis Smith, director of the Geological survey; Clark Howell, editor of the Atlantic City, Constitution; Federal Judge Alschuler of Chicago; Charles P. Neill, and former Vice President Marshall, made a formal call upon President Harding. Dr. Edward Devine of New York, the seventh member of the commission, did not attend the opening session.

"The sole object of the commission," said a statement issued by its members, "as declared at the meeting today, is to endeavor to get all the essential facts touching the coal industry to the end that practical measures may be found to insure a constant supply of this most necessary commodity at as reasonable prices as are consistent with fair wages and profits to those engaged in the industry.

Education Best Selling Method for Equipment

Director of National Institute of Progressive Farming So Tells Implement Manufacturers.

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Education of the farmer to the need of improved equipment is the best method of selling farm machinery, Guy H. Hall, director of the National Institute of Progressive Farming, today told the manufacturers assembled at the annual convention here of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers.

"Don't worry because the farmer seems more prone to buy a new automobile than a tractor," he said. "From that automobile the farmer's son is learning mechanics and he is certain to demand a tractor when father concludes to do some riding in the automobile and let the boy do some tussling with the furrows.

Favors Elastic Credit System

R. H. Thorpe Declares Low Interest Loans Needed by Farmer.

The United States must have a more elastic system of farm credits which will enable producers to borrow money at a low rate of interest and hold it long enough to tide them over in any period of price deflation, in the opinion of R. H. Thorpe of Lincoln, republican candidate for congress from the first district to fill the unexpired term of former Representative Heavis, who resigned to help prosecute the alleged war fraud cases.

Mr. Thorpe made this assertion in a statement outlining what he considers the important issues of the present political campaign. Revision of the federal reserve bank act also is suggested by him.

"The producers and farmers of the west have just passed through a very destructive period of price deflation and enforced liquidation and millions of dollars have been lost." Mr. Thorpe said in his statement. "This can be remedied," he added, "by a revision of our federal reserve act. We must have a more elastic system of farm credits which will enable the producer to borrow money at a low rate of interest for a sufficient length of time during a period of price deflation to save him from ruin and bankruptcy."
