

Many High School Football Teams Clash on Husker Fields Today

South High to Meet Nebraska City in Omaha

Central Journey to Council Bluffs to Tangle With Lincoln—Tekamah Tackles Creighton High.

FOOTBALL games galore will be played on Nebraska field Saturday afternoon in the first Missouri Valley conference game of the season for the Huskers.

Captain Herbert Bunker, center and tackle, is expected to get into the fray. Bunker injured his ankle in the Iowa State game. "Bob" Scannell, sophomore, second-string quarter, will pilot the Tigers in place of Kelley. Harry Schwimmer, end, is expected to get into the lineup, although he has an injured ankle, which he received in the Grinnell contest two weeks ago.

All of the games scheduled today, only two are carded for Omaha. Nebraska City and South Omaha play at the Western League park, while Creighton High and Tekamah mingle at Creighton athletic field.

Central journeys to Council Bluffs to meet the Lincoln High eleven of that city, while Coaches Drummond and White of Tech will take their students to Beatrice where the Maroon and White team tackles the strong Bowmen's squad in a game which is being watched with interest by all the high school fans of the state.

Central is not expected to have much trouble with the Iowans. Coach Bunker's team has yet to buck up against a Nebraska high.

Packers Lose Two.

South Omaha, on the other hand, has met two state teams and has lost both games. First, the Packers were defeated by Fremont and then by Lincoln.

Nebraska City defeated Haydock, 6 to 6, last Friday when Albert made a 45-yard run for a touchdown. As usual, to out-state fans who have witnessed Albert in action, the Packers will find it to their benefit if they keep an eye on this player.

Creighton High and Tekamah play on Creighton field this afternoon. Last week Tekamah easily defeated the Bessele eleven and unless Creighton has improved considerably since its game with Central, the out-stateans are liable to beat it out of town with another victory tonight.

Tech Meets Beatrice.

Tech plays its first state eleven today. And, in meeting Beatrice, we must confess that the Omaha team is taking one tough team. Beatrice has not been defeated this season. Neither has Tech. Coaches commanding gridsters have defended the out-state squad for the past two years and are expected to do so again today. Tech has represented one of the strongest lineups in the state, bar none. The Omaha backfield, judging from their recent games, has the speed and each backfield man appears to have the stuff under his cap that makes good football ground gainers—namely bounces.

Last Friday Beatrice eliminated the Alliance from further consideration in the state championship race by defeating the latter team, 21 to 15.

However, reports received here tell us that injuries handicapped the Alliance squad after the first half.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—Negotiations for the sale and transfer of the Sioux City (Ia.) franchise of the Western League to Lincoln, Neb., are underway, President Tearey announced yesterday.

Lincoln formerly was a member of the league, and the Sioux City club played its last 12 remaining games of the season there because of the small attendance at home.

Walter Mattick, president of the Sioux City club, is willing to sell, provided the terms are satisfactory. Business men of Lincoln are back on the market and will take the odds under North Platte, 1921, state champs.
