Peter was credited with having raised a \$9,000 fund in Victoria, B. C., during the world war by sitting on a table every day for three years and "speaking for contributions."

Women Aid in Repelling Troops Sent Into Hills

Adrianople, Oct. 21.—(By A. P.)—Women carrying shotguns over their shoulders were conspicuous among the 10,000 Christian refugees who trudged through the main street here today on their weary way to the frontier across the Maritza river. These armed women had joined their men folk in repelling an attack upon them by Turkish irregulars in the bleak hills west of Adrianople. The line of trading refugees extended in an unbroken mass several miles along the route of flight when the Turkish irregulars, who had landed at Medea on the Black sea, here down upon them.

Banner of Party Strife Hoisted in Great Britain

London, England, Oct. 21.—(By A. P.)—David Lloyd George, the retiring prime minister, speaking at a great meeting of coalition liberals here this afternoon, declared the "banner of party strife" had been hoisted at the recent meeting of conservatives at the Carlton club, which voted against continuing the coalition.

Four Men Are Arrested for Boxcar Thefts

France Will Continue War Against Profiteers

Paris, Oct. 21.—There will be no let-up in the prosecution of French war profiteers. This was assured today, when the senate quickly adopted a measure already passed by the chamber of deputies, continuing in operation the anti-profiteering law which would have expired next Monday.

Movement Started to Bar Jean Longuet From Country

New York, Oct. 21.—The American Defense society announced that it had lodged a protest with the State department at Washington against the admission to this country of Jean Longuet, grandson of Karl Marx, on the ground that he is an active supporter of revolutionary Russia, which according to the society, is now attempting to overthrow the United States government.

League Council Opens Conference in Vienna

Vienna, Oct. 21.—The league of nations council opened a conference here today with delegates from 13 countries. America was represented by Prof. Jeremiah Jenks of New York university. Turkey and the Chinese had the largest delegations.

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Dry Ruling in Force at Midnight

Decision of Attorney General Prohibiting the Sale of Liquor on Steamships Becomes Effective. Hope for Court Action. Washington, Oct. 21.—(By A. P.)—Provisions of the liquor statutes held by Attorney General Daugherty to prohibit transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages on American vessels anywhere, and on foreign vessels within three miles of the United States coast, became effective at midnight.

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
