P.)— Nomen carrying shotguns over their shoulders were conspicuous among the 19,000 Christian refugees who trudged through the main street here today on their weary way to the frontier across the Martza river. These armed women had joined their men folk in repelling an attack upon them by Turkish ir regulars in the bleak hills west of Adrianople. The line of trudging re-fugees extended in an unbroken mass at Farm Festival fugees extended in an unbroken several miles along the route of flight when the Turkish irregulars, who had landed at Media on the Black sea. hore down upon them.

The fight lasted an hour and two refugees were killed. Most of the disconsolate exiles who poured through the streets of Adrianople today came from Maleura, Kashan and neighboring villages to the south.
