

Church Council Urges Voters to Back Prohibition

Statement Appeals to "All Christian People" to Secure Impartial Enforcement of All Laws.

Washington, Nov. 1.—Regarding the present moment as a critical one in prohibition legislation, the Federal Council of Churches has issued an urgent message to the churches.

It appeals to all Christian people to exert every influence to secure the impartial enforcement of all laws and in every state actively to support public office those who are loyal to the constitution and to their oath of office to maintain it.

The immediate occasion for the statement is the announcement at Washington on October 18 by the organized forces which are fighting for the repeal of the prohibition legislation that they are organizing support at the coming election for candidates who will vote to legalize the manufacture and sale of beer and wine.

Not only this open attack upon prohibition, but also the more subtle efforts to prevent the enforcement of the existing legislation are pointed out and the necessity of urging the churches now to play as vigorous a part in the maintenance of respect for law as they formerly played in securing the enactment of the prohibition legislation.

Further, the sale of beer and wine would require some agency for distribution and so would lead inevitably to the return of the outlawed saloon with all its attendant evils.

Even more serious than the open campaign against prohibition are the sinister influences constantly at work to prevent the honest enforcement of the existing law.

The Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America therefore appeals to all Christian people to exert every influence to secure the impartial enforcement of all laws.

Since the forces of prohibition are now united to defeat the constitution it is high time for the Christian forces of our country also to unite and to be as consistent at the ballot box in their support of

How to Keep Well

PROBLEM OF PURE WATER.
Water from a driven well is compared with that from a dug well is more apt to be pure because there is less danger of pollution at the top, and seepage into the pipe in the first 25 feet is not likely to occur.

There are instances on record of safe water from driven wells becoming polluted and spreading typhoid, when pumps were hitched to them. As a rule, deep wells furnish safe water if the top and upper stretches of the well are water-proofed and properly protected.

Artesian wells furnish safe water supplies almost without exception. Flowing wells are doubly safe because the water in its underground bed is safe and the pressure of the water in the pipe prevents inflow of pollution.

Rain water is an excellent source, provided roofs and gutters are kept reasonably clean and the storage facilities are properly protected. Some people do not like the taste of rain water. Primarily, the taste is due to the absence of minerals and the small amount of air in this water.

Perhaps this is as good a place as any to say that hard waters are not as harmful as people think. They waste soap and are hard on some fabrics but there is little proof that they are harmful to health.

There is no health objection to a cistern in the attic, likewise properly protected. A glass window in the top of a cistern, permitting sunlight to reach the water, increases its safety.

Rural homes should have a water supply in the house. A yard privy, comparatively inoffensive and very unpleasant in extremely cold weather, is productive of constipation—one of the most widespread and one of the most harmful of all bad habits.

One reason why the younger generation leaves the farm, is the lack of plumbing in farm houses. Gerhardt cites the following study from the United States Department of Labor bulletin:

flour beetle. I cannot judge which, from your description. What I write applies to all of them.

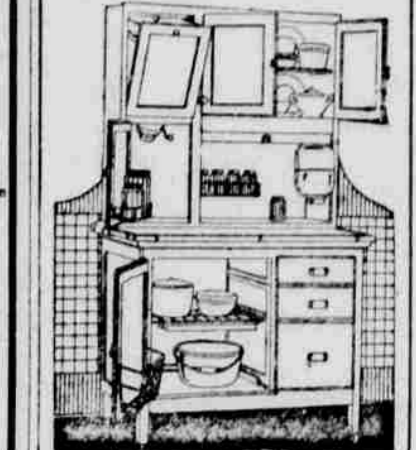

Guy Kiddoo, Omaha Trust company and chairman of the districting committee in the Omaha loyalty anniversary celebration of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, has been assigned to one of the most difficult jobs of the celebration, that of districting Omaha so workers can canvass membership prospects with a minimum of time.

Obtaining a list map of Omaha from the city engineer's department, Mr. Kiddoo divided the city into 30 districts, naming each after a past president of the Chamber of Commerce. The teams, also named after previous administrations, were assigned to the districts in proportion with their names and put to work under the direction of O. T. Eastman, general chairman, F. T. B. Martin and Frank Myers, vice chairmen.

In addition to districting the city, Mr. Kiddoo has also directed the sorting of 8,000 circulars and cards which are being mailed from time to time to Omaha's business men.
